Opening of the Seventh Annual Bench Show

NOTED DOGS ON EXHIBITION

The Pointer and Setter Classes the Principal Features

Several of the Coast Champions on View. Falling Off in the Large Breeds. Awarding the Prizes

The seventh annual bench show of the Southern California Kennel Club opened in the unfinished brick block, opposite the Chamber of Commerce, at Fourth street and Broadway, yesterday. While the quarters selected are not what they should be, the room has been made comfortable, and the kennels are fairly arranged. The officers of the club are on hand, and the accommodations for visitors are very good, all things considered. While the entries are not so numerous as in former years, they include many

noted dogs, while the general run is far above the average, even for a bench show. The pointer class is especially well represented, and indicates the increasing popularity of this useful dog, which is especially adapted to Southern California. Among the best known representatives of this class are Mrs. H. M. Tonn's champion Amariy's, Eugene Maxwell's Hindoo, Wm. J. Nordholt's Sport and A. E. Messerly's Bob. R. H. Widney also has a fine dog just imported from the East, which he has named Donald's Hope. This dog was bred by Dr. J. R. Daniels of Cleveland, O., and is out of Graphic Rose by Donald's sensation, and will be quite an accession to the stud dogs on the coast. Tonn's of the Solano kennel also has some very likely young dogs entered, and thinks he has a derby winner among them, though which one he declines to say. English setters are also well represented. Henry T. Payne, formerly of Los Angeles but now of San Francisco, is here, and is represented by his famous thousand-dollar Countess Noble, one of the handsomest dogs of her class on the coast. John Bradbury is represented by Pop K, a handsome dog that took the prize in his class at the San Francisco bench show in 1892. The Irish setters are a fine lot, the star of this class being A. B. Truman's champion, Dick Swiveler, the greatest Irish setter west of the Rockies. The young dogs show up well, three or four of them being valued at \$500 each. The Gordon setter class is represented by one or two good ones. This breed is not a special favorite on the coast, and while the dog is a good one it is not popular. The spaniels are not a specially good lot. S. H. Lavery has two Clumbers entered, the only specimens in the show. Mr. Lavery is a Clumber enthusiast, but he finds it uphill work introducing the breed, which is a rare one, and which can trace its ancestry back for numberless generations. J. B. Arnold has a fair field spaniel in Little Nell, winner in the puppy class in 1894. The cockers are, as a rule, below the standard, though there are some good dogs among them. Dr. D. O. Weeks' Bronia is perhaps the best of the lot. Arthur S. Auchincloss, also of Redlands, has one or two good entries. The fox terriers are a great lot, this class being the most numerous in the show. Owing to the efforts of C. A. Sumner and others this dog has become a great favorite in Southern California. The foxterrier is a thorough aristocrat, and perhaps the best of the smaller breeds. He is as game as a fighting cock, companionable, intelligent and trustworthy, and is essentially the gentleman's dog. The large breeds, such as mastiffs, St. Bernards, etc., are not especially well represented, with the exception of Borglum's Great Danes, nor are the toy classes well filled. There is a fair display of bulldogs and bull terriers, with a number of good grayhounds. There are only one or two collies, bloodhounds, deerhounds, pugs, and a solitary Newfoundland. The show is essentially a display of hunting dogs, and as such it is a good one. Owing to the fiesta attractions the attendance was only fair, though it will doubtless improve during the remainder of the week. The officers of the club this year are as follows: President, C. A.
