CASE GONE TO THE JURY

The Trial of Wong Cheuy Nearing an End

The Accused Murderer of Lou Sney Will Probably Soon Know His Fate—The Closing Argument

After ten days of a most arduous trial, eight of which were consumed in introducing testimony and in arguments, the case of Wong Cheuy, one of the Chinamen accused of the murder of Lou Sney, a man belonging to a rival tong, was finally given to the jury at 10 o'clock last night.

All through the trial the defense had more or less delicately tried Won Chee, the boss man of the gang which is charged with the murder, and endeavored to establish his good reputation for peace and quiet.

Mr. Gage accused the prosecution of jobbery. Judge McComas in his argument admitted that there had been jobbery—jobbery of the most barefaced kind—but he denied emphatically that the peon had induced in it the man who had been guilty of jobbery, he said, was the sick Chinaman who had sat behind the attorneys for the defense, the man whom Chief of Police Sney had acknowledged on the stand to be a favorite of his, the man for whom a former police commissioner had vouched.




