NO ICE TO CUT
Fruit and Meat Shippers to Refrigerate With
Ice
CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—Contracts were
drawn up in Chicago today by means of
which it is promised that packers and ship-
pers of perishable food products will in
future get along without ice.
Dr. A. T. Perkins, now a resident of
Chicago, has patented a process of keeping
meats, fruits and perishable products dur-
ing transportation by the use of sterilized
ice. His patents extend to the Antipodes.
The contract concluded today was between
him and J. M. Smart of Melbourne, man-
ager of the Australian Meat Transporta-
tion Corporation, limited, for the use of the
process in refrigerating meat. The
corporation is also to be formed, with
headquarters in Chicago, to control the
process over the railroad lines of this
country and steamship lines running
from the ports of North and South America.
Dr. Perkins left Chicago this afternoon for
New Orleans, where the sterilized air pro-
cess of the ice is being tried. It is expected
that a line of fruit steamers, plying from that
port, upon his return he will sail for
Australia.

Johannesburg
JOHANNESBURG, Feb. 19.—An explosion
of dynamite has occurred at Viendendorp
and the poor quarters of the town has been
blown to pieces. Hundreds of houses are
in ruins and the havoc wrought is fearful.
A number of persons have been killed and
the populace has turned out en masse and
is working to rescue the bodies of those
buried in the ruins. The windows of every
house in Johannesburg were broken by the
explosion.
The dynamite which caused the catastro-
phe filled eight trucks, which were being
shunted. The explosion caused an im-
mense hole thirty feet deep. Every house
within a radius of half a mile of the
explosion was rased to the ground. Forty
dead, nearly all terribly mutilated, have
already been taken from the ruins, but the
work of searching the debris has scarcely
begun.
Two hundred of the most severely in-
jured were admitted to the hospital, where
several of them died. It is believed only a
few white persons were killed.
