
The Trinity Again Beaten in the Democratic Committee

COUNTY CONVENTION JUNE 13

And the Primaries Will Be Held on June 2

Special Engines for Some of the Old Guard But the Thing Went Right Just the Same—A Big Meeting

The Democratic county central committee yesterday by a vote of 43 to 41 repudiated the doctrines and practices of the political trinity which seek to make of the party in this end of the state the tail to the Southern Pacific railroad kite, the committee ordering that the coming primaries be held under the precinct and not the ward system, as had been for several weeks the contention of the trinity. The meeting yesterday afternoon was almost a repetition of the one held a week ago. There were some parliamentary wrangles, the same calling of names, the same int-



delegations and aspersions—and the same result. When the smoke of battle had cleared away the Old Guard was found picking so much of itself together as still had life enough to be breathing. Rogers of the Ninth ward, as soon as the minutes of the last meeting had been approved, moved that no proxies be permitted to be voted, which was held by any one not an elector of the precinct presenting the same. A parliamentary wrangle ensued at once. Adolph Ramish moved the shutting out of all proxies of whatever character. The substitute was defeated by a vote of 40 to 38. The original motion was then declared to have been carried. The order of business presented by Frank James as follows was adopted. Assessment of the delegates present, 50

The delegates from the Antelope valley had a special engine from the Southern Pacific to be at the meeting. The trinity has been beaten again; The Herald has won the light for respectable Democracy. IN THE POLICE COURTS McCarty Held on Two Counts—Various Petty Offenses The preliminary examinations of George H. McCarty for burglary and petty larceny, with a prior conviction, were held yesterday afternoon in Justice Owens' department of the police court.
