Decoration Day Bicycle Meet at the Park

A VERY GOOD TURN OUT

LARGE FIELD OF PROFESSIONALS AND A GOOD TIME

Baisden, the San Francisco Crack, Makes a Fine Exhibition of Trick and Fancy Riding

The Decoration day race meet yesterday attracted quite a large crowd to Agricultural park, and if the attendance was any criterion by which to form an

opinion as to the popularity that may attend Sunday racing, then the program as outlined in the future may be considered assured.

The grass stand was fairly well filled, while a goodly throng paid the general admission and a number of vehicles lined up on the inner side of the track, around the judges' stand. All the details of the meet were well attended to save that the track was not kept clear. This is an offense on the part of the public of old standing, and in order that Sunday racing may be made enjoyable it ought to be peremptorily stopped. More than once yesterday the referee had to threaten to call the race off before the stragglers along the track would even condescend to fall back, much less retire to their proper place on the outside of the railing.

The following track officers efficiently filled the duties devolving upon them: Referee, Phil Percival; starter, D. L. Burke; judges, C. Castleman, J. W. Cowan, W. W. Parker; timers, C. E. Capito, L. B. Winston, P. Lyndon, S. G. Spier; announcer, Dick Sullivan; and umpire, S. Larsen.

The racing as a whole was just fair, the one-mile, professional, developing some rattling good work, while the other events were just up to the average. The five mile team race was called off for the reason that the several teams that had entered did not come to time, with the exception of the East Side Cycle club. In such case the run for The Herald trophy was postponed. In the amateur events Cleaver of Chicago did not show up as anticipated. But Squires of Oakland carried off the honors in both events. Lacy didn't run, owing to recent illness, and Casenave, from whom a better showing might have been expected, trailed in with the bunch.

In the one mile open, amateur, the following were the entries: E. J. Baisden, R. D. Mussey, M. A. Casenave, East Side Cycle club, Howard Squires, A. C. W. of Oakland; John Burr, R. de Remer, San Fernando; M. C. Dodwell, the Australian rider; F. Anderson, W. L. Garrison, Clarence Coleman, Covina. This event afforded little scope for enthusiasm for Squires took the lead almost at the crack of the pistol and maintained his position to the end, finishing with about one and a half lengths to spare. Anderson was second, R. D. Mussey third, and W. L. Garrison fourth; time 2 minutes 23 seconds.

In the professional events there was a bigger list of entries, probably than ever before in Southern California. Vaughn of San Diego made a clever appearance and was more at home on the rough track than he would most likely have been if he had been running on a prop-

erly prepared bicycle track. he has not trained for some time, having been following his business steadily, and for that very reason he enjoyed some little advantage. The entries in the one mile open professional were as follows:

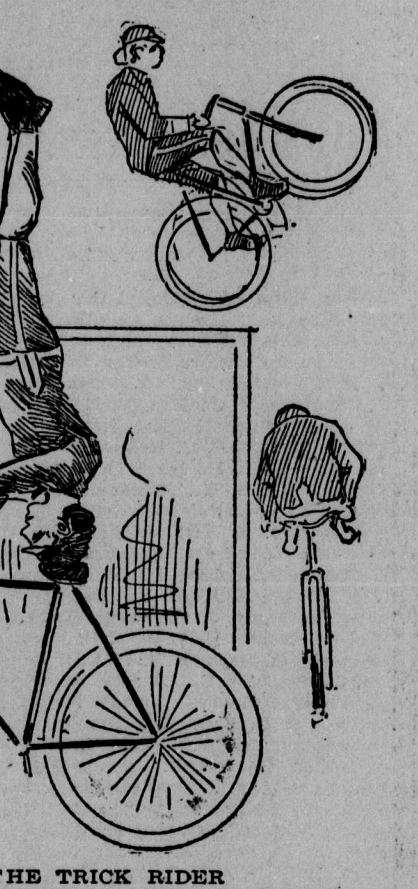

The riders made a good start but kept pretty well bunched together until entering the homestretch when Vaughn made a long sprint and won with Bell of Los Angeles second, and Slater of Arizona, third. The time was 2:32 and as a time limit had been placed of 2:30, the referee decided that the race should be run over.

The five-mile amateur handicap called out the following field: H. Squires, scratch; E. S. Salladay, 25 yards; Casenave, 15 yards; R. D. Mussey, 35 yards; John Burr, Jr., 50 yards; W. S. Garrison, 75 yards; E. L. de Remer, 175 yards; R. B. de Remer, 175 yards; Frank Anderson, 150 yards; A. W. Woods, 175 yards; Chas. Burr, 200 yards; C. Coleman, 250 yards; C. H. Prey, 300 yards, and M. C. Dodwell, 325 yards.

The wise ones saved themselves in this event for a hot last mile, and the

two eager ones came to grief. At the end of the first mile Prey was in the lead with Dodwell a close second. Going down the back stretch on the second mile two riders dropped out and Anderson passed the other first, R. B. de Remer second and C. H. Prey third. The third mile was finished with Dodwell leading, R. B. de Remer second and E. L. de Remer third. On the fourth mile Coleman dropped out and the string was passed



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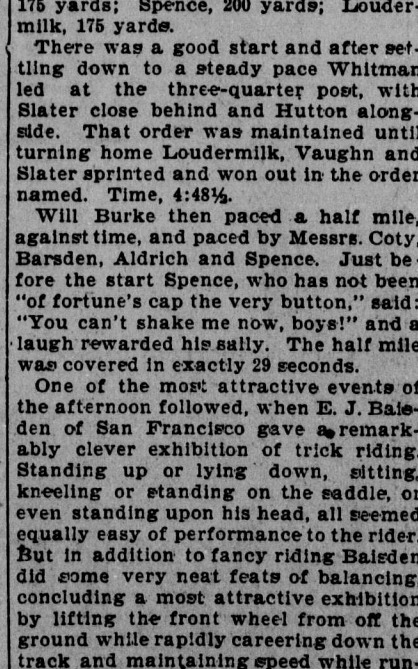
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CHAIRMAN ALVORD

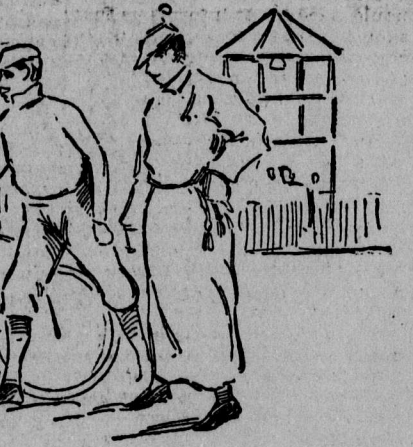

with Prey again leading, Dodwell second and E. de Remer third. On the last mile the riders that had been recovering their energy put on a spurt and crept up toward the head of the string of riders, and made quite a hot sprint coming down the homestretch. Squires, the scratch man, was first, Salladay second, R. D. Mussey third and Woods fourth. The time was 13:43.

In the two mile professional handicap the following were the starters: Whitman, scratch; Slater, 15 yards; Bell, 25 yards; Vaughn, 35 yards; Hill, 40 yards; Coby, 60 yards; Burke, 50 yards; Palmer, 75 yards; Hutton, 125 yards; Aldrich, 175 yards; Spence, 200 yards; Loudermilk, 175 yards.

There was a good start and after settling down to a steady pace Whitman led at the three-quarter point, with Slater close behind and Hutton alongside. That order was maintained until turning home Loudermilk, Vaughn and Slater sprinted and won out in the order named. Time, 4:48 1/2.

Will Burke then paced a half mile, against time, and paced by Messrs. Coby, Baisden, Aldrich and Spence. Just before the start Spence, who has not been "of fortune's cap the very button," said: "You can't shake me now, boys!" and a laugh rewarded his saucy. The half mile was covered in exactly 29 seconds.

One of the most attractive events of the afternoon followed, when E. J. Baisden of San Francisco gave a remarkably clever exhibition of trick riding. Standing up or lying down, sitting, kneeling or standing on the saddle, or even standing upon his head, all seemed equally easy of performance to the rider. But in addition to fancy riding Baisden did some very neat feats of balancing, concluding a most attractive exhibition by lifting the front wheel from off the ground while rapidly carrying down the track and maintaining speed while running on the one wheel.

The one mile open, professional, when run off was a vast improvement over the first race. The start was not very good, but at the three-quarters of the first mile Vaughn was leading, Bell crept into second place with Slater third, and in this order the first mile finished. On the run home Coby displaced Slater, and with that exception the racers won out in the order named. Time, 2:15 1/2.

Squires, Casenave and Mussey of the East Side club started to run against the five-mile competition record, but as Casenave dropped out on the third mile the event finished out.
