Producers Again Ask for a Reduction

THE REQUEST IS DENIED

MORE MEN NEEDED FOR THE STREET DEPARTMENT

Mr. Drain Asks for the Immediate Employment of Eighty Laborers and Twenty Teams—Notes

At the meeting of the finance committee of the city council yesterday, all the members were present while a number of citizens were also in attendance. The representatives of the Eagle Rock and Burbank producers, who appeared before the committee at the last meeting to urge the granting of their petition for lower rents at the market and making certain changes in the ordinance regulating the sale of fruits and vegetables on the streets, were again on hand. The gentlemen insisted that it was a hardship on the producers to compel them to patronize the public market and pay a high rent for stalls and then impose an additional peddling license if they wished to leave the market and sell to dealers throughout the city.
