PASADENA

PASADENA, June 30.—(Regular Correspondence.) The sewer question is still being discussed quite generally, especially by the East Siders, and all sorts of plans are suggested besides the one in contemplation by the city council, which is, however, the one most likely to be carried out. Some favor bonding the entire city for a complete sewer system, and if it were not for the fact that times are so hard this plan would meet with favor from a large proportion of the citizens, for the advantage of having a complete system throughout the city is patent to all. Another suggestion is that the city should be bonded to meet the expense of the proposed outfall or intercepting sewer on the East Side, but this would involve the expense of an election, which would amount to several hundred dollars, while the whole cost of this improvement would not be over \$6000. Besides, it takes two-thirds of the vote cast to do this, which is not likely to be secured. If the present plan is carried out, it will cost the residents of the East Side 4 cents per front foot for the outfall sewer, and if they are on the streets where laterals are to be laid there will be an additional 33 cents per front foot, making 37 cents for those located along the lateral sewer and 4 cents for those in the district not so located. Those living within the boundaries given below will be liable for the whole tax of 37 cents per front foot:
Lake avenue, from California to Santa Barbara.
Hudson avenue, from Colorado to Walnut.
Moline avenue, from California to the north city boundary.
Madison avenue, from California to a point 125 feet south of the southern line of Colorado street, from Colorado to a point 50 feet south of the southern line of Illinois; also from Fillmore north 250 feet.
Oakland avenue, from California to a point 115 feet south of the southern line of Eldorado street.
Galena avenue, from Walnut to Illinois.
California street, from Lake to Oakland.
Colorado street, from Moline westward to a point 125 feet east of Los Robles, also from a point 100 feet east of Moline eastward to the city boundary.
Center street, from Oakland to a point 215 feet east of the southern line of Los Robles.
Eldorado street, from Madison to a point 300 feet east of the east line of Los Robles.
First street, from Lake to a point 175 feet east of the east line of Moline avenue.
Hicklimer street, from Madison to a point 200 feet east of the east line of Los Robles.

Hull street, from Hudson to a point 175 feet east of the east line of Moline.
Walnut street, from a point 115 feet west of the west line of Lake westward to a point 175 feet east of the east line of Moline; also from Madison westward to a point 125 feet east of the east line of Los Robles.
Villa street, from Madison to a point 100 feet east of the east line of Galena; also from Galena westward to a point 175 feet east of the east line of Los Robles.
Glenmar street, from Los Robles to a point 245 feet east of the center line of Eastern avenue.
Franklin street, from California 600 feet south.

THE INSURANCE WAR
The local insurance war is still on; or rather, the revolt against the demands of the general managers of the insurance companies, who are trying to compel the local agents to come to their terms in regard to certain points in the management of the business, among which is the requirement that the local agents shall have but 15 per cent for the business they secure, instead of from 30 per cent to 25 per cent, as heretofore. Of course these demands are not confined to Pasadena, but are all over California, and a similar revolt is in progress elsewhere. The twenty-eight Pasadena agents have stood solid so far, and prospects are good that they will continue to do so. It is to be hoped that the people will get some reductions in rates out of the squabble, though there is nothing to indicate it at present.

BATTALION DRILL
Company I went over to Los Angeles for battalion drill last evening, about forty members turning out. The boys will go to church in a body next Sunday, at the Presbyterian church, and on the 4th will parade with the rest of the battalion in Los Angeles.
