D., 1897, entered an order upon the minutes of said Board, ordering that the question of the issuance of \$500,000 refunding bonds of Los Angeles County, California, bearing interest at the rate of four per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, all of which bonds shall run five years from their date, and then, \$1,000,000 mature each year, in the years 1902 to 1922, inclusive, should be submitted to the qualified electors of said county; and that a special election should be called for Los Angeles County, State of California, on Saturday, the 15th day of December, A. 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OHIO TALES

Of Buried Treasure Are Exposed

NO RICHES IN INDIAN GRAVES

W. K. MOOREHEAD DESTROYS A POPULAR SUPERSTITION

The Majority of the Tribes Had Neither Gold Nor Silver-Treasures Locating Fraud

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 10.-[Special Correspondence to The Herald.] For the benefit of the people of Ohio and of the residents of the United States who might be interested, I think it advisable for me to state once and for all as a falsehood the statement that the Indian mounds of Ohio contain buried treasure. They do not, and what is more, no archaeologist who has ever explored any of these mounds can truthfully say that he has ever discovered anything which can be called treasure as treasure is regarded by the public. The treasure of the mounds is purely of that value the standard of which is fixed by the archaeological.

I am aware of the fact that it is a well grounded popular superstition that the Indians of old in North America, like the Incas of Peru, had storehouses or caves, artificial or otherwise, in which precious metals were hoarded, but looking at it all from the basis of common sense and the knowledge that is open to the mind, it is singular that the senseless traditions relative to buried gold have gained ground among men. I often hear of the "lost silver mine," or the "lost lead mine" at which the Indians obtained metal for exchange and for bullion. Yet I find nothing about the reducing of ores and only had a faint idea that metal was dug out of the ground and the strange fancies some men have.

An old man told me in Adams county last year that the Ohio lead mine was on his father's farm. Then I think of this, that the grandfathers of one of the best known citizens saw the Indians shoot silver bullets which they obtained from a vein of pure metal somewhere in the Muskingum hills. A newspaper printed this and said: "And the state geologist and all our scientists know not who the valuable mine is." I only wish it were true, we would surely locate it.

In old Chillicothe, the largest town of the Shawnees, the traders distributed goods to the amount of thousands of dollars each year. Here is another place that is said to have its burials above ground. Men have spent much time and money in a search for the spot, but of course in vain. A party, of which I was a member, once opened graves there but only found the usual run of Indian trinkets. The old sites of Wyandotte, Monsey, Miami and Delaware were also said to have their buried treasure traditions. Did any one ever find treasure? Of course not.

One of the most amusing experiences I ever had has a bearing upon this subject. A few years ago myself and several others were digging a mound of the questioned pre-historic date. The owner, who had the pre-historic treasure buried in his bonnet, compelled me to sign a paper to the effect that all gold and silver found was to be his. He was at the
