"Do the heirs of a suicide have to prove the insanity of the deceased in order to recover the amount of his life insurance policy?" is the question that is not unattainable, already referred to in these columns. To which it is replied that Justice Harlan's decision can hardly overrule the terms of a contract. In the case which he decided, the insured committed suicide within less than a year after increasing his insurance to the extent of \$200,000, and it was shown that he had written a letter the day before his death, stating that he intended to kill himself, so that his life insurance could be used to pay his debts. Of course, if such a trick upon an insurance company were to be permitted, honest minded policy holders would be the sufferers, because their interests could not be properly safeguarded. Justice Harlan did not decide that the heirs of a suicide have to prove the insanity of the deceased in order to recover the amount of the policy. He decided that when a man deliberately declared that his purpose was to kill himself to get the benefit of his life insurance he should be held to forfeit his policy. The case referred to went before a jury and was appealed from court to court until it reached the highest court in the land, and the jury and the courts all decided against the insured.

The letting of the contract for putting underground the extensive system of wires for the Edison Electric company in this city marks another step in municipal progress towards the point where all such wires shall be removed from the disfiguring position they now occupy in the public streets. The Edison Electric company, which is the successor to the West Side Lighting company, will have to expend about \$150,000 in the work now being undertaken for the purpose of complying with the city ordinance requiring all wires to be put underground on or before April 1st. It is worthy of note that the corporation did not find it necessary to accept an offer made to it by the General Electric company of Schenectady, N. Y., which submitted figures for installing the whole underground system. The Edison company obtained a local bond issue for the Alcatraz Paving company was able to do the work at figures which were satisfactory, and therefore decided to give the contract to a home institution. The Alcatraz people are also doing the work of putting in the conduits for the San Gabriel Power company and are under contract to get this work done in time for the resurfacing of Spring and Main streets.

The works of the Edison Electric company are to be built upon the lot formerly occupied by the Massachusetts Benefit Association to the east of the Johnson house, the company having just purchased the lot for that purpose.

It may interest some of the mourning members of the Massachusetts Benefit Association to hear that its assets amount to about half a million dollars, and that the accrued claims thus far made aggregate over \$1,000,000.

The exports of California wine from San Francisco by sea for the year 1937 were as follows: Eastern, gallons, 4,385,982; Foreign, gallons, 538,794. Total, 4,924,776. Also 283 cases to eastern markets and 12,882 cases to foreign markets for the year 1937.

Shipments by rail to the east for the same period were 9,008,000 gallons and by water 5,433,145 gallons, making a grand total of 14,441,145 gallons. The shipments for the year is \$5,709,237, against \$5,633,728 for the same time last year.

A process has recently been perfected by which thin sheets of cellulose are transparent and silvered, and are used in the process formerly used on glass. Such a plate of cellulose is covered with silver on the back, and another cellulose plate is fastened on the back of the mirror thus formed. This naturally forms another mirror, so that the value of the celluloid mirror is enhanced by being equally perfect on either side, making it a double looking glass.

The Wright Wave Motor Company has granted to the Ocean Power Company its rights for this county, on an annual royalty of five dollars per horse power for every horse power developed, and one-fourth of its capital stock. The grantee is to build "such wave motor plants as may be necessary to supply the existing demand for power within the county."

Insurance Notes: The San Francisco News Letter says: Benjamin Goodwin has been named as assistant coast manager of the American S. P. Paul-Davis & Henry have been appointed coast agents for the Greenwich and Victoria Fire Insurance Companies. President Chase of the Hartford Fire is on his way to the coast. The annual meeting of the Underwriters' Association next week will be followed by a banquet. The Pacific Mutual has made Georgia—Charles A. Laton has been elected coast manager of the Traders' Fire. The Fire Underwriters' Inspection Bureau inspected 21,233 buildings last year. The act of the legislature of the Territory of New Mexico regarding insurance companies, is to go into effect on February 1st, and provides "that all insurance companies doing business in that territory shall deposit \$100,000 in cash, municipal or territorial bonds at par, as a guarantee for the payment of losses." About seventy companies will be affected.

ON 'CHANGE

Conditions Shown by the Dealings on Wall Street: NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Today's stock market was lifted to a higher level by the conspicuous strength of comparatively few debilities, which gave the initial impetus to yesterday's advance, showed the effects today of profit taking. Lake Shore losing two points and New York Central a small fraction. Michigan Central, after losing upward at the opening, reacted over a point, but closed with a substantial gain. The far-reaching importance of the merging of New York Central and Lake Shore and the prospects of additions to the plan continued to have a marked sentimental effect all along the line. At different times during the week the market has been under the influence of aggressive strength in Chesapeake and Ohio, Baltimore and Ohio, Louisville, Pennsylvania, Northern Pacific preferred, the coalers, Union Pacific, and other less conspicuous stocks. Wide advances have occurred in some of the high priced, closely held investment stocks, notably Great Northern preferred, which advanced an extreme 27 points, but reacted four points. The bond market has continued to show the great activity and strength which it did in January. The total bid price value in January was nearly \$33,000,000. This total was never exceeded on the exchange, except in October, 1935, when the sales exceeded \$40,000,000. In view of the present importance attached to the New York Central-Lake Shore consolidation, it is considered significant that the previous period of greatest activity was at the time of the West Shore settlement. Kansas Pacific consols showed an extreme advance for the week of 1 3/4 points, and the United States new fours, registered, advanced 3/4 do. coupon, ex-interest, 1/2 do. four registered and the five registered, and the old four coupon and the five coupon, ex-interest, 3/4 bid.

CHICAGO MARKET

Prices and Prospects of the Trade in Cereals: CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—For a few minutes after the opening wheat was inclined to sympathize with the action of the Liverpool market. That market, after opening at a high bid, declined and closed 1/8 cent lower, in the face of yesterday's improvement here. The first sales of May were consequently at a slight decline, May opening at 93 3/8¢, and closing yesterday's closing price of 93 1/2¢. Besides the Liverpool decline, northwest receipts continued heavy. Moderate buying by the long interests, principally, supplemented by a little covering by short brokers of near by contracts, yesterday, carried the price of May steadily up to 95 1/2¢. The advance was aided by the continuous strength of oats and provisions, both of which markets made new prices for the season during the morning. There were reports of grain famine from parts of Southeastern Russia, and a decline in the price of wheat in the drought. A factor in the advance was the report that the reduction in the Italian grain duty would probably remain in effect until the end of May. Prices eased off slowly, but closing Parigables caused another brief period of strength. Paris was from 40 to 65 centimes higher for flour and 10 to 15 centimes higher for wheat. Durable in the face of the session prices gradually receded. May closing at 95¢. Oats were firm but dull, and May closed unchanged. Corn was active, and the market made a new high point for the season. May closed at 24¢, an advance of 1/4¢. Provisions were active and active. Packers did considerable buying. Prices reached the highest point of the season, but heavy realizing at the top caused a reaction. The market closed steady, but with all the advance lost. May, pork, lard and ribs closed 2 1/2¢ lower.
