

DEEDED TO THE CITY

GENEROUS GIFT OF G. J. GRIFFITH

THE PRESENTATION SPEECHES

Replies by the Mayor and President of the Council—Senator White's Introductory Remarks

A representative gathering of business and professional men, comprising members of the board of city and county officials and men who have been prominent in the upbuilding of Los Angeles, assembled in the council chamber yesterday afternoon to attend the special session of the council at which the city was presented with a clear deed to the magnificent tract known as Griffith park.

There were representatives of the chamber of commerce, the board of trade, the Merchants and Manufacturers' association, in fact an assembly more typical of the enterprise, business push and solid wealth of the city would be hard to get together.

The special session had been called for 3 o'clock, but long before that hour the crowd began coming and by 2:45 the chamber was well filled, the walls inside the hall being lined with chairs, while the lobby was packed with the throng extending out into the hall.

After calling the clerk to read the call for the special meeting, which was done without further ado, Mr. Silver stated that all he had to say was that the deed was done, and that it was unnecessary to tell any inhabitant of the city of Los Angeles of the magnificent gift now to be finally transferred to the municipality.

SENATOR WHITE'S REMARKS
In company with several gentlemen your humble servant has been made one of a committee in the transaction of the formal transfer of Griffith park to the city of Los Angeles, and we have deemed it proper to make today a more than common event.

It is unnecessary for me to enumerate the magnificent donation of Mr. Griffith; there is no one in the city who does not appreciate the generosity and nobility of heart which has moved him. In these days of grasping and money getting it is a cheering sight to see one man bent on making so magnificent a donation to the public weal.

THE DONOR RESPONDS
There were repeated calls for Mr. Griffith, who for a time seemed reluctant to respond, but he eventually stepped forward and said that I am not a speaker, as you will probably be convinced before I am through.

Short addresses of a complimentary character, similar to the foregoing, were made by W. C. Patterson, ex-president of the chamber of commerce; J. S. Slauson, Judge R. H. F. Varley and Hon. W. H. Workman, ex-mayor and present park commissioner. Mr. Workman promised on behalf of the park commission, that the task of improving Griffith park should be begun at the earliest possible opportunity and carried to its ultimate completion as fast as funds for the purpose became available.
