The long tulle veil was fastened with a diamond ornament, the gift of the groom, and the bride carried an armful of long-stemmed roses, tied with white ribbons that reached the feet of her gown. From the roses fell a shower of orange blossoms caught at the ends of narrow white ribbons. The bride's only attendants were her two little nieces, Edna and Florence Newmark, who were frocked in white satin and lace, and carried baskets of rose petals. The music was furnished by Arend's orchestra, the march from "Lohengrin" being played as the bride party entered. "Call Me Thine Own" during the ceremony, and the "Wedding March" by Mendelssohn at its close. A program was read, and the bride departed during the evening. The rooms had been elaborately decorated under the direction of Mrs. Bancroft, the suite of five rooms on the west side and the long hall and stairway being all in white and green. Masses of bridal wreath, long ropes of smilax, quantities of white satin and lace, long festoons and huge bows of white tulle were arranged with effect, and in the room where the bride party gathered was arranged a bower of the white tulle, over which trailed sprays of smilax.
