WITH THE AMERICAN FLEET OFF SANTIAGO DE CUBA, Saturday, July 12, 6 p. m., by the Associated Press dispatch boat Wanda, via Fort Antonio and Kingston, Jamaica, July 12, 11 a. m.—The news that the surrender of Santiago was accomplished fact was wired to the fleet at Guantanamo on the flag ship New York.

Acting on Gen. Shafter's message of Thursday, which stated absolutely that Santiago had already surrendered, Rear Admiral Sampson abandoned all preparations for entering Santiago harbor and a further bombardment.

When Gen. Shafter said yesterday that a hitch had occurred and the city might have to be taken by force of arms, it was believed that the navy would have to be continued, and the harbor forced, and that the arrangements already in progress for further camp operations would be seriously interfered with.

Miles on the Flagship This forenoon Gen. Miles and his staff went aboard the New York. For an hour Gen. Miles sat upon the quarterdeck of the flagship explaining the situation here to Admiral Sampson and discussing details for the future co-operation of the navy and army.
