GETS BONES INSTEAD OF GOLD Syndicate Learns a Geologist's Map Is Wrong. Sometimes a man of talent is concealed behind a dull exterior. Some months ago a Mexican from Sonora was employed as a woodchopper at Phoenix, Ariz. He was a vrey good woodchopper, and by his efficiency in that profession alone he won the confidence and respect of his employer. It transpired, though, that he was something more than a woodchopper. He was a man of geographical information and a past master in the art of map drawing. He put a sample of his work on exhibition and it commanded rare attention. It represented a section of Sonora in the vicinity of Magdalena, and it contained the designation of a spot marking the site of a mine of marvelous wealth. He had been there and knew all about it. The existence of the map and mine became known to a dozen of the wisest, best and foremost men of Phoenix. They gave the Mexican all the consideration he desired, and then formed a syndicate for the rediscovery and development of the mine, from the Mexican's glowing description of which convinced them that they had the world by the tail on a thirty per cent grade, pulling downward. About two weeks ago a member of the syndicate, the Mexican and the map went to Sonora to give it another yank. The member of the syndicate returned later alone. He admitted to other members of the syndicate that a startling discovery had been made. The spot designated on the map as the site of the mine was easily located. They sunk a shaft and came upon some human bones. Then they drifted among more, and having exhausted that pocket they estimated that they had bones enough for sixteen skeletons. They concluded there might be an error; they prospected a while in the vicinity. Nearly every shaft led to a deposit of bones, until the conviction was finally forced upon them that they were mining in a graveyard. It was, too, so old a graveyard that all surface indications had long since disappeared, so that it couldn't be the mining site the Mexican had in mind when he constructed his map. The syndicate is not yet discouraged. It believes that mine is somewhere in that neighborhood, but that the bearings are wrong—Chihuahua Enterprise.

General Wheeler's Plan. The most interesting part of the Cuban question just now is the plan offered by General Joseph Wheeler to educate, free of charge, in colleges in this country, young natives of the island. Nearly every college in the United States is interested in the plan. General Wheeler has commissioned Mr. Gilbert K. Harroun, treasurer of Union College, to communicate with every American college and ask each president if he would agree to educate, free of charge, young Cubans. Mr. Harroun has already communicated with 300 colleges. Among those who have written offering their hearty co-operation in General Wheeler's suggestion are President Eliot of Harvard, President Low of Columbia and President Raymond of Union. Favorable replies have also been received from the Roman Catholic colleges in Washington and Georgetown, the Quakers' college in Haverford and from many southern and western universities.
