in this city.


her with no money. This proved a bitter

his wife's death. The following telegram
was received last night from a Mr. E. W.
Wright, who apparently is a friend of Gray:
"Gray very ill. Please make unusual ar-
rangements. Will send money."

GRAY'S PECULIAR HISTORY
Charles de Garmo Gray was generally re-
garded by the men who came in contact with
him in this city as a remarkably shrewd
little man with a genius for the organiza-
tion of exhibitions and fairs, but neverthe-
less there was something about the man
that to those who saw much of him caused
a feeling of distrust. A man intimately
connected with him during the Home
Products exposition in this city said last
night: "Gray is a smart enough little fel-
low to look at, with an engaging address,
but the poor little woman who lies dead sup-
plies the brains of the firm. She was an
expert woman of business, and during the
exposition here used to make up the cash
every night and keep the accounts. Their
four months' work here netted them about
\$1800, which Gray explained, they divided
in equal shares."

Yesterday Charles de Garmo Gray's latest
widow was found dead by her own hand, ab-
solutely penniless.
Destitute in a strange city, deserted by
her husband, whom she had raised to suc-
cess, estranged from her family, and dis-
cussed, both in mind and body, Mrs. Jessie
E. Gray ended her misery Monday night by
shooting herself in the head with a pistol.
The body was not discovered until yester-
day morning. The dead woman was of al-
most world-wide reputation, for through
her husband, Charles de Garmo Gray, the
well known promoter of exhibitions, she had
traveled extensively on both hemispheres,
and was well known to the hundreds of busi-
ness men, with whom her husband had oc-
casion to meet.

PREPARED TO DIE
The woman prepared herself to die by
attiring herself in her best dress and silk
underclothes. She wrote the farewell let-
ter to her mother, Mrs. Julia Gilman, at
209 Fulton street, Rochester, New York,
and she was satisfied that Gray was not con-
ducting himself fairly toward her in Oak-
land. With the loss of her husband and
