JAPANESE PROVE FINE LINGUISTS

MIKADO'S SUBJECTS LEARN ENGLISH READILY
Bright Child of Former Well Known Artist of the Orient is the De-light of Fellow Countrymen

During the past few months residents of Los Angeles have been greatly surprised by the ability of visiting Japanese merchants and officials in speaking the English and many other languages.

An explanation of the perfect pronunciation of the Japanese has been given by Totako Kawara, a Japanese artist and courier dealer on South Main street. Kawara has been in the United States scarcely more than one year and his English is rounding into excellent pronunciation.

In speaking of the Japanese linguists he said: "Since the Japanese adopted the civilized methods of American many years ago the linguists of my country have been perfecting themselves in the English language until it is taught by American teachers in many of our universities and schools."

Shortly after his arrival in America Mr. Kawara came to Los Angeles and opened a curio store. In Japan, prior to his immigration, Kawara was an artist of no small note and since coming to the United States has instructed many of his countrymen in the Japanese style of painting and drawing.

To this he has added the American style of drawing, making a new addition to the many advancements of the finer arts of the Japanese. Mrs. Yume Kawara, the little wife of the artist, is one of the fairest flowers of the Orient and is also a clever linguist.

A little over a year ago, shortly after the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Kawara in Los Angeles, a little almond eyed stranger arrived at the family household on South Olive street and the celebration of his first birthday was held three days before Christmas. The boy is exceptionally bright and is the pride of the Japanese residents of the city.

The naming of the baby occurred shortly before his first birthday and was accompanied by appropriate ceremonies, and after that as is the custom in all well regulated Japanese households, a profession was selected for him, to follow. This custom in the extremely young of a Japanese child has caused the men and women of that nation to be among the most skilled artisans.

Japanese Surgeon
The father held for the boy to follow the army life of the Mikado's troops but the mother refused and the laughing little youngster is to be fitted for the life of the Japanese surgeon and physician. His name, Horo Saku, has various meanings in his native tongue, chiefly referring to a happy state of prosperity.

The rearing of the child will be along the modern views of the Japanese and when the boy begins to find that he has a tongue for the purpose of speech, an American nurse will be hired and he will be taught the language of his land of birth prior to receiving instruction.

The Kawara family is regarded as one of the highest types of the Japanese immigrant to the United States.

All sorts and kinds of fruit have been started east from this point, even luscious, ripe strawberries, packed in a trim little pasteboard box. Just yesterday Postmaster Wood found a box containing a single big orange. In consequence of this last seizure the old-fashioned sign, to which the local grammarians take exception, will once more be placed in a prominent position in the office. It reads as follows: "Oranges, lemons and other green fruit is not mailable."
