NEW LIQUOR ORDINANCE ADOPTED IN REDLANDS

City Trustees Discussing Water Rates, Basketball Team to Meet Los Angeles

REDLANDS, Feb. 16.—Matters of considerable importance occupied the city trustees' meeting yesterday afternoon. About an hour and a half was consumed by a committee representing the Y. M. C. A. and George A. Cook of the Domestic Water company in the discussion of the water rates.

Mr. Cook claimed that they had been giving the Y. M. C. A. a flat rate of \$15, which was a reduction of \$7.50 per month. The matter was laid over for future consideration.

Another important piece of business was the passing of the new liquor ordinance, which provides that the owners of drug stores or other places where liquor is kept for sale, either for medicinal purposes or otherwise, must first secure a permit from the board of city trustees after filing formal application setting forth the name of the one directly responsible.

It also provides that druggists can sell liquor only upon prescriptions from a physician not in any way connected with the business, and that all such prescriptions must be kept on file for the inspection of the city marshal.

The Casa Loma asked permission to serve wine at table. The request was granted, with a bond fixed at \$500.

The park committee was authorized to employ a gardener to attend to Smiley park improvements, at the rate of \$75 per month.

HOW HATS CAUSE BALDNESS

They Make the Scalp a Hothouse for the Budy Microbes

There is every reason to believe that primitive man had a thick and abundant head of hair, and that this natural clothing of the scalp is diminishing among civilized peoples, and will end by disappearing altogether, which would certainly not be advantageous from an esthetic point of view.

The hat produces baldness by two different methods. First, by creating about the head an atmosphere which is fatally warm and moist, and which prevents the penetration of the rays of light that are so fatal to bacteria; the hat makes for the microbes a sort of improvised hothed, which is extremely favorable to their development, and it is known that microbes play an important role in the production of baldness.

Again, the hat, holding its place upon the head solely by pressure, exerts a second pernicious influence upon the scalp; it compresses the arteries and the veins; it impedes the circulation of the blood and, consequently, the nutrition of the organs which produce the hair. It is, therefore, doubly desirable that the reign of the hat should cease, in the case of men—for with women the hat is so light a thing that it can exert only a trifling proportion of the ravages it is responsible for in men—and that this garment should be renounced or replaced by some less injurious article.

JUDO AFTER JIU JITSU

Annapolis Has a Teacher of the Higher Art

Not content with securing for their charges instruction in jiu jitsu, the Annapolis authorities have secured for them a teacher competent to impart a knowledge of "judo," something of which westerners never heard before—something of which jiu jitsu is only a part and the beginning.

How to do many wonderful things will be revealed to them, but they will then be in about the position of a man to whom a prestidigitateur has revealed the secrets of his miracle. He understands, but he cannot duplicate till years of practice have trained hand and mind to swiftness and certainty, and he cannot do it then if he lacks a special aptitude for such work.

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
