LOCAL GOLFERS PLAN TOURNEY

PLAY FOR CHAMPIONSHIP TO BEGIN WEDNESDAY

Contest Will Be a Feature of the Southern California Season. Rules to Govern the Contest

Those who find pleasure in ambling over the green with Colonel Bogey will have one of the most active weeks of the season, beginning Wednesday when play will commence on the links of the Los Angeles country club for the amateur golf championship of Southern California.

The general public has been showing an encouraging interest in the game of late and there has been a crowd on the country club links daily—rain or shine.

Contestants will play a qualifying round of thirty-six holes, medal play. The best sixteen scores shall then be taken and the contestants making these scores will then play eighteen holes, match play, until but two competitors remain, who shall then play the final game consisting of thirty-six holes, match play.

In case of an uneven number of entries the executive committee has decided to appoint a player to play with the contestant drawing a bye. In the event of a tie or ties for the sixteenth place in the medal play round the contestants who have tied will continue to play until one of their number gains the lead by strokes, the holes or holes to be played out.

It will be seen that those who have arranged for the championship tournament have made every possible preparation to meet any contingency that may arise during the course of play.

The winner of the tournament will be considered the champion amateur golfer of Southern California for the year of 1905 and the trophy will be held for the year by the club from which the victor in an entry. The winner will receive a gold medal, the second a silver medal and the third and fourth bronze medals.

Play in the tournament will begin Wednesday, February 22, at 9 a. m., medal play the first eighteen holes; 1 p. m., the second eighteen holes, medal play; Thursday, February 23, at 9 a. m., the first eighteen holes, match play; 1 p. m., the second eighteen holes, match play, and each succeeding day at same time and place until the match is decided.

Never in the history of the club have there been four horses entered in the free-for-all trot, which will be the case at the coming matinee. The "pink" horse, Rozelle, showed such surprising speed and form at the last matinee that the speed committee feels warranted in promoting him to the top notch.

While those mentioned will be the star races of the day, many fast and promising horses are entered in the other divisions. This is especially true of the 2:20 pace. Six horses are entered for this event and there is not a second's difference between them in speed.


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
