

GOOD THINGS FAIL TO LAND

KITTY ROARK AND BORGHESI ARE BEATEN

Fair Racing Card Draws Out a Good Crowd and the Public Has a Shade the Best of the Betting

The card provided at Ascot yesterday was a good one, even rather above the average than the usual Friday program.

Pleasant weather, a fast track and close finishes added to the enjoyment of the sport and the crowd was unusually large.

Three selling races and three purse events were down for decision and the fields were fairly well balanced.

Of the nine that went to the post for the six-furlong sprint, first on the card, Kittle Roark was a well liked and heavily played favorite, but she did not justify the confidence reposed in her.

She opened at 7 to 10 and was hampered down to 3 to 5 at post time. She seemed unable to raise a respectable gallop, although she was persevered with, and under keen urging all the way.

Lady Ninora, opening at 6 to 1 and receding to 9 to 1, landed the long end of the purse after being out-paced the first part. She moved up like a flash entering the stretch and overhauled Chalk Hedrick at the paddock, and then in a mild drive held the latter. Kitty Roark ran a dull and listless race and just managed to keep Mascare out of the money.

Gorgalette Beat Borghesi

Borghesi, with W. Miller in the saddle, was made favorite for the seven-furlong purse race, second on the card. Florista, at 100 to 1, made a four-flushing exhibition as far as the half mile pole, with Gorgalette and Borghesi in close attendance.

Gorgalette, at 15 to 2, showed a nice burst of speed, ran Florista into the ground early and easily stood off Borghesi's bold challenge. The latter was badly mosed about at the start and had to be much used early to get up with the leaders.
