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SALOON KEEPERS WARNED

Police Commission to Enforce Ordinances Strictly

That the new police commission is determined that the traffic in saloon licenses much stop, and also that women and girls must not be served with liquor by saloon keepers, was made manifest yesterday in a notice which Chief Hammel sent to all saloon keepers in Los Angeles.

The order states that hereafter when a license is revoked the commission will give it to any applicant they deem fit, and that the custom which has hitherto been followed of letting the breweries dictate to whom it shall be given will be done away with.

The part which applies to serving women and girls with liquor will be strictly enforced by Chief Hammel and his men. Any saloon keeper caught serving members of the gentler sex with liquor will be reported to the commissioners and the chances are that the guilty one will lose his license.

WORKINGMEN FIGHT FOR CHANCE TO SHOVEL SNOW

Advertisement in New York Paper Attracts Crowd Wild for Opportunity to Work

NEW YORK, March 2.—A newspaper advertisement, offering a day's work to fifty snow shovelers, brought such a crowd of applicants to a point at Fifth street today that the police reserves were called out to check the scramble for work. More than 300 men who came in answer to the advertisement were in waiting before daylight, when the man with fifty checks, each of which would entitle the holder to a day's work, appeared on the scene. The sight of the checks was the signal for a rush, in which every one of the 300 joined. Men were tossed right and left in the scramble to reach the holder of the checks, and within a minute every one of the bits of paste-board had been given out. This did not stop the trouble, however, and when the police reserves, who had been summoned at the first rush, appeared, more than a score of individual couples were fighting hand to hand for the right to shovel all day for \$2.
