FINALS IN LADIES' GOLF TOURNEY

MISS SALTONSTALL WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeats Miss Smith in a Well Played Match at Coronado—Men's Tournament Finished Today

SAN DIEGO, March 10.—Another perfect day, not so warm that the sun was not pleasant and not so cool that the breeze from the ocean was not welcome, brought many attendants to the golf links at Coronado today to witness the finals of the ladies' tournament and the semi-finals of the gentlemen's tournament.

The championship was won easily by Miss Rosmond Saltonstall of Boston, and Beverly, who defeated Miss Ada N. Smith of San Diego. A crowd of sightseers followed the ladies over the links watching the play. The score at the close of the eighteen holes was 4 up and 3 to play. Miss Saltonstall is a member of the Essex County club of Massachusetts and the Brookline Country club.

The preliminary and semi-finals of the men's championship were played today. In the forenoon Hugo Johnstone beat Walter Crosby 5 up and 3 to play. C. L. Williams beat T. S. Lippy 3 up and Walter Fairbanks beat Montgomery Ward 6 up and 5. Alex Reynolds beat W. H. Eaton 8 up and 6.

Fairbanks in Finals This afternoon Fairbanks beat Reynolds three up and 1 to play and Williams beat Johnstone one up.

The day's play eliminates all save Fairbanks and Williams and they are to meet tomorrow for the finals. Eighteen holes will be played in the morning and eighteen in the afternoon.

To the winners of the two tournaments will be awarded the large silver cups offered for the occasion by Hotel del Coronado. These cups are alike, being designed like a fourteenth century pitcher or jug of silver and standing 22 inches high. The winners will also be presented with small replicas of the large cups which they are at liberty to retain as their personal property, while the large cup becomes the property of the player only after he has won it three in succession.

While the program announces that the championships are of Coronado, the players are from all over the country, most of the strangers (?) being guests at the hotel for the winter. Montgomery Ward is the well known merchant of Chicago, who spends each of his winters here with his family and usually a party of friends. T. S. Lippy comes annually from Seattle. He was instructor in the Y. M. C. A. there until the Alaska gold excitement brought water to him in large measure. Walter Crosby comes from St. Louis and Hugo Johnstone from Pasadena. Walter Fairbanks recently won the amateur gold championship of Southern California at Los Angeles and came within one of getting the open championship here early in the week, being beaten only by Alex Smith.

The men's tourney will be finished tomorrow and next week on the 15, 16, 17 and 18 will be held the handicap tournament for both ladies and gentlemen. Entries will not close until the morning the contests begin.
