One of the noteworthy features of this company is that, with the single exception of Lule Warrenton, who "made good" as character woman with the Ulrichs last year, the members will all be new to Los Angeles, and it is promised by the Grand opera house management that the company will be much stronger in every respect than that of last season.

Richard Buhler, the leading man of the company, is one of the best known stock actors of the east. He is a man of striking appearance and athletic figure.

Ethel Clifton, the leading woman, has also had a long experience with stock companies in Brooklyn, Cincinnati, Montreal and other eastern cities. Her work is characterized by a sympathetic quality which enables her to secure strong effects without apparent effort.

John Harrington, who will play leading "heavy" parts, has been identified with James Nell and the Majestic theater in San Francisco, and is already well known in the northern part of the state. He has not been seen here for several years.

Brenda Fowler has never played on the coast before, but has had several years' experience in "heavy" work with companies in New York and on the road in the eastern states.

Henry Auerbach, the comedian of the company, comes from W. A. Brady's forces, and has played with "Way Down East," Ralph Stuart and in stock in Boston.

Hope Mayne, the soubrette, comes from Australia, and this is her first American engagement. She has been on this side of the Pacific for about eight weeks. She is a charming actress, and is also a singer of considerable ability. She will be one of the "sunshine spots" in the new company.

Miss Warrenton is well known from her consistent work last year. John Hynes has been with Frederick Warde and stock companies at the Alcazar, San Francisco; Columbia in Portland, and also in Cincinnati. Henry Spear has been with Henry Miller, Mrs. Fiske and the Alcazar stock company, San Francisco.

The other members of the company are all experienced in their own lines, and each has been chosen with a special view to his fitness for a definite line of parts.

BILLIARDS HARMLESS SPORT, SAYS JAMES

Police Commission Not in a Hurry to Grant Applications for Licenses

Owing to the fact that there are at the present time 115 pool and billiard halls in Los Angeles and that the new police regulations will soon drive the loafers out of the saloons, Chief Hamel yesterday asked the commission to refuse all applications for billiard licenses until the working of the new rules can be observed.

The request came after several licenses had been granted, but the commission immediately reconsidered and revoked the licenses granted. This recommendation from the chief provoked a warm discussion of the subject, which resulted in the question being laid over for one week.

Commissioner James declared that billiards is a harmless amusement and that the board should not refuse to grant licenses to proper persons. Later he moved that the board pledge itself not to grant any billiard and pool licenses during the term of its official life, but the motion was lost.

FIXES NO BLAME FOR AUTO WRECK

INQUEST HELD OVER BODY OF
MRS. PEASE

Husband Has Not Learned of His
Wife's Fate, and Asks Con-
tinually as to Her
Welfare

"An accident for which no one can be held responsible," was the verdict at an inquest yesterday morning over the body of Mrs. Sherman Pease, the victim of the Hollywood automobile accident, who was instantly killed in the collision.

The evidence, of everyone who was in the neighborhood at the time or who had any accurate knowledge of the condition of the road at the point of the accident, was thoroughly investigated by Coroner Trout before a jury at the Brees Brothers morgue during the examination and the verdict of accident was returned.

Arrangements are being made for the funeral services which will probably be held from the Pease residence on South Hope street, either today or tomorrow. The other victims of the same accident were reported in improved conditions yesterday. They are still at the Hollywood hotel where they will probably be kept for several days before being removed to their homes in Los Angeles.

No alarming symptoms have developed in the case of Mrs. Decatur E. Wellcome, who was severely injured in the collision. Three ribs were broken and she sustained many minor injuries but thus far is improving rapidly. She is still in ignorance of the death of Mrs. Pease and has ceased to inquire about the details of the accident.

Sherman Pease, the owner and driver of the machine, has not yet fully regained consciousness. Yesterday several of his intimate friends were admitted to his room and he recognized them but was not allowed to talk much. He is recovering from the shock of the accident and the terrible blow on the back of his head.

During the entire day Mr. Pease constantly called for his wife. Attendants in the room turned away to hide their emotions as the young man asked whether his wife knew of his condition. From the dread of injury to his wife, his thoughts have turned toward a new channel and he now thinks that she is safe. He has not been told any of the details of the accident, and physicians are awaiting until he is stronger before telling him of her fate.

DESERTED WIFE SUES HENRICI FOR DIVORCE

The marital troubles which Philip Henrici and his wife contracted when they were married romantically in Los Angeles a few months ago appear to be reaching their termination. Yesterday Mrs. Henrici appeared at the court house with her attorney and filed suit for divorce from her young husband.

Henrici, who is the son of a Chicago millionaire, married his wife in this city and then went to Pasadena to live. Parental objection was too strong for the young man to overcome, so he left his bride and returned to the home of his father in Chicago.
