

DUNN MAY SAVE FIGUEROA STREET

SAYS HUNTINGTON LINES DO NOT DESIRE FRANCHISE

Attorney Declares That the Railroads Will Not Buy Right to Run Cars on the Boulevard

"The Los Angeles Railway company nor any other street car company now operating in Los Angeles desires a franchise down Figueroa street, south of Washington street. They will not build a line down that street, neither will they buy the franchise. If the city, or the citizens in that part should lay the track and give it to the companies I represent, they would not operate the line," declared W. E. Dunn, attorney for the Huntington interest in Los Angeles before the members of the board of public works.

This declaration on the part of the man who represents and advises Huntington rather took the wind out of the arguments of the real estate dealers who were backing the scheme, and who, previous to this had declared that if this petition, which they filed with the council Monday failed to accomplish the desired end they would get up another and another until the line was established.

The question was referred to the board of public works by the council Monday and in expectation of a decision on the subject the committee rooms were crowded with advocates of both sides of the question. Major Klökke appeared with a protest signed by nearly every property owner on Figueroa street between Washington and Jefferson streets against the car line being established in front of their homes and thus destroying the only boulevard in the city.

A quorum of the board could not be obtained so definite action on the subject was not taken, but those members present declared that the question was settled absolutely by the statement of Attorney Dunn.

When spoken to individually, members of the council were unanimous in indorsing the deductions of the board and stated that they were opposed to building a car line on this street and disturbing its quiet.

Councilmen declare that the street is really a park where the poor man and his family can stroll on Sunday afternoons in peace and safety and thus for a short time get away from the clatter and grime of cars and machinery.
