

# BOAK ELECTED TO SUCCEED FOLEY

## WOODMEN CHOOSE SET OF NEW OFFICERS

### LATHASHAW IS HEAD CLERK

After Business Session Visiting Delegates and Women of Woodcraft Attend "Old Heidelberg" at Belasco Theater

California has surrendered one son to honor another, and with the election of officers by the head camp of the Pacific jurisdiction of the Woodmen of the World yesterday I. I. Boak of Oakland will assume the duties of head consul, succeeding John H. Foley of Los Angeles.

While Mr. Boak has lived in Denver for the past five years, where his duties as chief clerk of the Woodmen required his presence, he still maintains his California residence. His election, therefore, is considered no less a victory for this state than would have been the case had Mr. Foley been chosen again.

It was afternoon before the delegates in attendance at the head camp meeting were given an opportunity to select a new set of officers, and by 7 o'clock the slate had been completed. In many cases there were heated contests, but once over the delegates whose lot it was to lose joined in cheering the men named to manage the affairs of their fraternity for the next two years.

Head consul, I. I. Boak; head auditor, A. E. Sunderland of Fresno; head banker, P. E. Snodgrass of Eugene, Ore.; head clerk, John Lathashaw of Pueblo, Colo.; head auditor, F. P. Bertschy of Denver; head physician, Dr. T. A. Hughes of Denver; head escort, E. F. Conner of Seattle; head watchman, A. F. Argall of Everett, Wash.; head sentry, Charles Bauner of Larabee, Wyo.; head managers, W. C. Hawley of Salem, Ore.; Thomas L. Robertson of Oakland, and James Stenhouse of Denver.

**Elected on First Ballot**  
Mr. Boak had but one opponent, A. B. Keith of Butte, Mont. The vote stood 2600 to 491 in favor of the former. John Lathashaw, head clerk; F. P. Bertschy, head auditor, and Dr. T. A. Hughes, head physician, were the only officers elected unanimously.

The morning session was devoted to further discussion of the salaries of various officers. The feature of the day's proceedings, however, was the election of officers.

When it was announced that Mr. Boak had been elected head consul a committee was appointed to escort him to the platform, where he was given an ovation. A bouquet of American beauty roses was presented to him by Fremont camp of Los Angeles, and a handsome assortment of California poppies by his home camp of Oakland. Mr. Boak addressed the delegates, thanking them for the high honor they have shown him.

After the meeting adjourned last evening the officers and delegates, with their wives and families and the visiting members of the Women of Woodcraft, attended the performance of "Old Heidelberg" at the Belasco theater. The officers occupied the boxes, while delegates filled the dress circle, orchestra and balcony. Many appeared in uniform, making an imposing spectacle.

Fremont camp is preparing to give an elaborate reception in honor of the newly elected officers Monday night. The quarters of the camp, in the Ramona block, Third and Spring streets, will be prettily decorated for the occasion, and music will be furnished by an orchestra composed almost entirely of Woodmen. Speeches will be made, after which refreshments will be served.

At their session yesterday the Women of Woodcraft transacted considerable business, and it is probable that when the circle convention reconvenes Monday the question of establishing permanent headquarters will be taken up. It is said Los Angeles has an excellent chance to win the honor, in which event the proposed new building, to cost between \$50,000 and \$75,000, will be erected here.

Today the visiting fraternity folk will enjoy a trip to Catalina Island.

## STREET BETWEEN WEDDED PAIR

### BRIDE OF AN HOUR DESERTED, SHE ALLEGES

### NEVER LIVED WITH HUSBAND

#### Remarkable Story of Short Matrimonial Career Told by Mrs. Belle Jungquist, Who Was Granted a Divorce Yesterday

Wedded to the man she loved for just one hour and living within sixty feet of him for more than a year without speaking to him was the story recited by a fair young woman in Judge Trask's court yesterday afternoon, while the judge listened in amazement to a case which proved one of the most uncommon in the history of the local superior courts.

The young woman was Mrs. Belle Jungquist, nee Hays, the 19-year-old daughter of George Hays of 1447 East Twenty-second street. January 29, 1904, the young woman was married to Emanuel Jungquist, 20 years old, and an employe of the Scovell iron works of Los Angeles. Jungquist at that time lived at 1448 East Twenty-second street, directly opposite the home of his fiancée.

The petite little blonde girl, scarcely more than a child, hung her head in embarrassment as she took the witness stand in Judge Trask's court and told her trouble.

"We were married on January 29," she said, "and I have never lived with my husband and he deserted me shortly after the ceremony. I do not know why he did it. We had had no quarrel at that time."

**Mother Objected**  
"A short time prior to our marriage we had a quarrel and I understood his mother was opposed to the marriage. When he at last decided to get married and the consent of his mother was required, he was told by her that if he had no objections to getting married, his mother certainly had none."

"We were married and then went to our home, and I loved him and wanted to live with him but for some reason which I cannot even imagine he left me. Left me within an hour of the wedding ceremony and went back to his home and since that time has never spoken to me. Day after day I have seen him go to work in the morning and return in the evening, but have never received a word from him."

"I at last decided that I did not care to live under the existing circumstances and I applied for a divorce."

"Do you mean to say that this man left you within an hour after marrying you and with no other reason than those given?" asked the judge.

"I do," said the girl, and she was granted a divorce.

## NEW BUILDING FOR U. S. C. DENTAL SCHOOL

Ground Broken for Three Story Structure Corner of Winston and Wall Streets

Ground was broken at the corner of Winston and Wall streets yesterday for the construction of a three-story brick building for the use of the dental college of the University of Southern California. The first floor of the building is to be used for store rooms while the two upper floors will be occupied by the college. The present quarters of the college are crowded and the students are forced to go to the medical college building for a number of their lectures.

The new quarters are large enough to comfortably house the school and it is planned to have the infirmary, clinic and lecture rooms fitted up with every modern appliance. Special attention is being paid to the lighting of the infirmary in order that the embryo dentists may have every facility for learning their profession.

On the second floor will be located the infirmary, laboratories, library, offices, reception and smoking rooms. The lecture rooms, surgical room, anatomical rooms, physiological laboratories and X-ray laboratories will occupy the third floor.
