FEAR DANGEROUS PRECEDENT

PASADENA, April 21.—The mayor and city council may put a ban on the proposed Sunday performance at the Southwestern family theater, where it is advertised that a biograph production of the Passion play will be put on next Sunday.

SAN DIEGO, April 21.—By the ruling of Judge Torrence the Methodists are permitted to sell their church block to U. S. Grant for \$100,000.
