MAYOR'S CABINET DISCUSSES DRESS

PEEK-A-BOO SHIRT WAIST MAY GO

SUMMERLAND IN THE CHAIR

Acting Chief Executive Gathers His Advisers in Conclave—Great Reforms Are Planned

The fate of the peek-a-boo shirt waist and "lo and behold" evening gowns hangs in the balance. Mayor Summerland's great reform cabinet has taken the question up and before many days laws may be enacted prohibiting the wearing of such garments until they have been passed upon by a committee of the cabinet and the necessary permit issued.

Custodian of the Red Vest brought the question before the august body, declaring that it was high time the subject received attention. He appeared to believe that the subject in question came directly under the duties of his department but Philosophical Reflections broke in with:

"I have noticed many of these 'see-through' articles of apparel on the street and from their appearance it has seemed to me that perhaps the wearers were economically inclined and were merely saving money by using last year's lace curtains in the construction of their shirt waists. It appears to me that we should go slow when dealing with this question. If a wife is willing to save the cost of a new waist by wearing an old lace curtain, and thus be able to get new lace curtains to make her home more attractive for her husband when he comes home at night tired with the labors of the day, I think we should be the last to discourage such worthy motives."

No Action Taken
The question of the "lo and behold" gown then came up and it was declared that Old Philosophy's argument did not hold good in this case. An informal decision was reached that the cabinet should pass stringent rules upon this subject and thus boom the dry goods business in Los Angeles.

The question was laid over for a day without any definite action being taken. The remainder of yesterday's session of the cabinet was given over to grave discussion of the liquor question.

How to get sufficient amber and red eye to satisfy the longings of the spirits of the various members of the cabinet without cost to the said members was the chief topic of discussion.

Custodian of Booze Petitions moved that orders be issued to all the saloons in Los Angeles informing the proprietors that, should they presume to charge a member of this, the greatest of reform cabinets, for liquor in any quantity or quality that he should desire, the license for conducting the saloon would be promptly revoked.

Grand Marshal of the Circus Parades moved an amendment to the motion before the cabinet to the effect that all saloon keepers should keep their places of business open day and night, and that any one not obeying this rule be imprisoned for one month in the city jail and fined \$100, the fine to go to the cabinet.

Owing to the press of private business the cabinet adjourned, as has become the custom of reform cabinets, without taking definite action upon anything except Mayor Summerland's cigars.


ASKS \$25,000 DAMAGES FOR INSULTED DIGNITY

The Rev. Mr. Welsh was well known in church and temperance circles, having been in the ministry fifty-eight years. He passed away at his home Wednesday evening, after an illness of but a few hours, at the age of 81 years and eight months.

The Rev. Mr. Welsh continued an active interest in the cause of temperance, which he espoused until the time of his death. He pronounced the benediction at the temperance meeting last Sunday afternoon, which proved to be the benediction of his long life of service in the cause of Christianity.

BUSINESS GOES TO NEW CLARK ROAD

FIRST TRAINS MAY BE RUN IN TWO SECTIONS

POPULAR WITH MERCHANTS

Fast Time for Freight Gives the Salt Lake an Apparent Advantage Over Competitors—Directors Meet Again Today

The first freight and passenger trains to leave Los Angeles over the new Clark road Monday night will probably have to run in double sections.

The first passenger train will carry, besides its own Salt Lake service, personally conducted excursions of the Northwestern and Denver & Rio Grande roads. Nearly all the Pullman accommodations have already been reserved. Tuesday night the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy will send out a personally conducted excursion.

It was given out from the freight department yesterday that the road had contracted for thirty-five cars of freight, and more was constantly coming in, making two sections almost imperative by the time of departure.

With inquiries for freight service have come all manner of solicitations for the first way bill that is made out, and the head of the freight department, as an incentive for the favor, has been asked to accept presents of almost every kind and description.

Directors to Meet
Directors of the Salt Lake road will hold another meeting at 11 o'clock this morning, after which Senator W. A. Clark will leave for Jerome, and the directors residing in Salt Lake will go to San Francisco, with the expectation of returning to Los Angeles May 8, when it is probable another meeting of the directorate will be called.

Although there was no official session of the board yesterday, directors of the road spent the larger portion of the day at the offices of the company in the Pacific Electric building, where there were frequent consultations between Senator Clark and the resident members of the company.

OLD WOMAN HURLED FROM CAR INTO STREET

Trolley Started as She Was Alighting, Throwing Her Violently to the Ground on Her Head
While alighting from an Eastlake park car about 8:30 o'clock last night at the corner of East Main and Sotello streets, Pantallona R. de Ortiz, an old Spanish woman, was thrown violently to the ground, sustaining a deep scalp wound and internal injuries, from which she will probably die.

The woman had just placed one foot on the ground, according to bystanders, when the car started and she was hurled head foremost into the street. It is believed her head struck on a rock, as there is a laceration fully two inches wide.

The victim was taken to her home, 1433 Weyse street, where Dr. D. M. Lamoree is attending her.
