SPINAL MENINGITIS WANING IN NEW YORK

Commissioner Darlington Insists That It is Attributable to Children Having Improper Food

NEW YORK, May 5.—Three deaths from cerebro spinal meningitis have occurred within the space of three hours at Bellevue hospital.

In support of his theory that children must have proper nourishment in order to withstand the ravages of meningitis, Commissioner Darlington will today take up with the committee of physicians the matter of instructing the parents of school-children as to what food should be provided them and for the morning meal particularly.

"This is a most important question," he said. "There are hundreds of school children in New York who do not get the right kind of food for breakfast. As a result we have so many half-nourished little ones starting out each day in a condition that makes them susceptible to almost any disease."

WILL ADDRESS STANFORD GRADUATING CLASS



MEETS HORRIBLE DEATH

Engineer of Factory in Redding Is Caught in Machinery

REDDING, May 4.—Alonzo Custer, engineer of the Long Spur Sash and Door factory, near Sisson, met a horrible death last night. His clothing was entangled in the main shaft in the mill and before the eyes of a helpless comrade he was whirled with frightful rapidity. His left arm was torn from the shoulder, his left leg broken in three places and his ribs were caved in. He died two hours afterward.

ARCHBISHOP AGIAS IN SERIOUS CONDITION

ROME, May 4.—A cable dispatch received at the Vatican today reports that the condition of Archbishop Agias, apostolic delegate to the Philippines, who has been ill with native fever, is grave, and that it is believed he cannot remain in Manila. He will be relieved of his duties when he is able to leave the Philippines.

PROTESTS AGAINST THE DISCRIMINATION BY GERMANY

NEW YORK, May 4.—President Herbert of the produce exchange today forwarded to the state department in Washington a protest against "the apparent deliberation of the German government to discriminate against American trade" under the new German tariff and expressing the hope that a treaty will be negotiated with Germany which will place American products on an equal basis with those of competing countries.

ANTI-SALOONISTS OPEN CAMPAIGN

LARGE MASS MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

WILL A. HARRIS SPEAKS

Declares That the Closing of Liquor Houses Will Not Injure but Improve Los Angeles

The Anti-Saloon league fired the opening gun of the present war against the liquor interests of Los Angeles at a large mass meeting held last night at the Asbury Methodist church, and now the campaign may be said to be on in earnest.

Mr. Harris spoke on the question of temperance and stated that the closing of saloons would not injure Los Angeles, but ultimately improve it.

The speaker stated that the clearing house receipts were greater last week than in the history of the city and the building permits of the past month the largest during the year. He attributed this marked prosperity not to the move of the Anti-Saloon league, but to show that the present agitation is not injuring business. He stated that the money now expended in saloons would be invested in business enterprises. He cited the railroads, which he said were temperance organizations in themselves and the care of the employers to secure temperate employees.

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The news of these new fever cases, coming so soon after the recent favorable report of Governor Davis, has made a disagreeable impression for the reason that the new patients are of a class of employes regarded as intelligent and competent to observe all the rules of hygiene and follow closely the well-established method of protection against the fever.

Recent reports from the isthmus, however, show that conditions are abnormally bad, owing to what is almost a water famine and to bad weather. It is believed by the officials here that the conditions will improve steadily. Within a few weeks the new water supply system, bringing pure mountain water into Panama, will be in operation and when the city is paved with vitrified brick and sewered it will be the cleanest city in the tropics.


