NEW CHAPTERS IN BUILDING LAW

Several Volumes of Amendments to New Building Ordinance Are Promised in Near Future.

Sections Repealed

Now that the garbage question has been settled the councilmen feel that they are in training to grapple with the building ordinance and make something tangible out of it.

It has been suggested that if they threw away the ordinance entirely and began on a clean slate they could easily make a good job, but what the real effect of the outcome when the complete set of volumes comprising the amendments are all published will be in now a conjecture.

The effect and general purport of the ordinance as originally drawn by the commission appointed by the old council may be surmised from a few of its rulings. There is to be erected in a few months on the present site of Hazard's pavilion, now known as Temple auditorium, a magnificent building bearing the latter name.

Peculiar Oil Section

Again the ordinance prohibits the storing, development or refining of oil outside of a certain district, and the section of the city now known as the oil section, in which all of the large oil companies are located, was excluded.

A board of five master plumbers, who shall examine all persons desiring to embark in the plumbing business in the city before they receive their licenses, was also provided for. This raised a tremendous amount of opposition from all independent and non-union plumbers, and the city attorney is at the present time redrawing this portion of the ordinance.

The building ordinance has been passed and is supposed to be in force, but nothing can really be done with it until the chapters which have been held up for repairs are put into shape and the whole thing is in working order.

DOG SHOW OPENS AT CHUTES PARK

Dogdom held sway at Chutes park yesterday. All through the morning and afternoon a continuous strain of somewhat unwholesome dog music issued from the large tent in which the canine exhibits are housed.

The opening day of the Southwestern Kennel club's bench show, which continues throughout the week, proved a grand success. No less than 300 canines were on exhibition.

When the show opened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock the dogs, with the exception of a few toys, were all in their proper benches.

Promptly at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, Judge Tom Ashton announced that he was ready to officiate upon the first class—the St. Bernards. Queen Regent II, a \$5000 bitch, which actually saw service among the snow-clad Alps of Switzerland, won the first prize in the open and limit class.

Two small-sized fox hounds were listed to be passed upon next, but when the owner made his appearance with the dogs Judge Ashton refused to pass upon them, declaring them immature puppies, and the prizes were withheld.
