ANNOUNCEMENT BY CELEBRATION COMMITTEE

FIREWORKS ARE ABANDONED

Transportation Companies' Failure to Contribute, as in Former Years, Causes Change in Program

The celebration of Independence day under the direction of the Fourth of July committee will be one of noiseless grandeur, according to information given yesterday afternoon by the committee secretary, William H. Kiler.

When the local street railroads refused to contribute to the fireworks fund as liberally as the Fourth of July committee had requested it was decided to inaugurate a noiseless and non-illuminous celebration, making a street parade in the morning and addresses in the afternoon the principal features of the occasion.

Last year \$1500 was expended on fireworks, which were displayed in all the city parks in the evening. It was the plan of the committee to repeat this feature of the celebration this year and invitations were sent to each of the local street car companies to contribute to the fund.

Railroads Backward Mr. Kiler says the railroads did not respond in the manner expected of them and were willing to give but about one-fourth of the amount necessary for such a display of fireworks as was originally planned.

After the railroads refused to come to the financial rescue of the committee it was planned to ask citizens and merchants to raise the necessary fund, but owing to the number of conventions recently held in Los Angeles and the liquor campaign which has so recently been settled, this plan was abandoned and there will be no "official" fireworks.

A committee meeting was called yesterday and, with the assistance of Mr. Kiler, the following program for the day's celebration was prepared:

Police, mayor, council, speakers and committee in carriages.

Militia, under Gen. Robert Wankowski.

Santa Ana Marching club.

Spanish American War veterans.

Knights Cavalry club, mounted.

Carriages, automobile and bicycles decorated.

There will be four divisions, a band heading each division.

Central park, 2 p. m.—Band, presiding officer, Dr. W. A. Lamb; reading of Declaration of Independence, music; oration, Bishop Conaty.

Eastlake park, 2 p. m.—Band, reading of Declaration of Independence, music. Presiding officer and orator to be selected.

LOVE OF "NIGGER" MONEY DISASTROUS FOR CHINAMEN

With Aid of Dark-Skinned Patrolman Detectives Break into Three Lotteries

Love of "nigger" money landed the proprietors of three Chinese lotteries in the city jail yesterday afternoon.

Detectives King and Riley, aided by Patrolman Stevens, a negro, succeeded in breaking into the lottery games within two hours.

The detectives say the Chinese lottery proprietors feel that the negro is their legitimate prey and would rather take his money than anyone's else.

Working on this theory, the detectives sent Patrolman Stevens, dressed in plain clothes, in the suspicious shops where the lotteries were supposed to be in operation.

The first place on which the scheme was tried was at 103 North Alameda street. Stevens was received with open arms by Quon Ton, the proprietor, but three minutes later he was under arrest, the two detectives having followed close in the wake of the negro officer.

Nuck Chuch and Lem Sing, 218 East Second street, were arrested in the same manner, and half an hour later Hing Sing was likewise captured at 507 Banning street.

Ball for each of the Chinamen arrested was set at \$100.



NOTED PHILOSOPHER-POET TO SPEAK AT VENICE



JOAQUIN MILLER

Cincinnatus Heine Miller, better known in the world of letters as Joaquin Miller, the nature-loving poet of progress, will visit Los Angeles in August. He will speak at the Venice assembly several times during his stay, and will read from his greatest and latest work, "The Building of the City Beautiful."

This poet is one of the most unique and interesting figures in American literary history, and is himself an exponent of his philosophy of ethics and economics. He is that rare combination, a man of essentially imaginative temperament in conjunction with the power of practical application. He is possessed of the insight of the mystic, the mind of the philosopher and the hand of the craftsman. He can labor while his dreams take form. He is a successful farmer and a successful poet, as well as a practical philosopher.

"There is a great deal more good in the world than it has credit for," he says. "After the love of man comes the love of nature." "We begin the next life where we leave off in this." "Nature wastes nothing, least of all time." "The sweetest flowers grow closest to the ground." "There is no art without heart." "The art of all art is really to know nature—yourself." "Man reads too much and reasons too little." "Great artists are not great readers but great observers. They see with the heart."

This is the teaching of the philosopher-poet, who will be cordially welcomed at the coast city this summer. Many have already accepted his exposition of progressive thought as it set forth in his writings, and many more will be glad to receive the message by word of mouth. His dates will be some time near the middle of August, and will be announced later.

THE WEEK'S CHURCH NEWS

CATHOLIC

The coming week will be one of activity in Catholic circles, as the commencement exercises of the different schools will cover the entire week.

Tomorrow a solemn mass of thanksgiving will be celebrated at St. Vincent's church, which the students will attend in a body. Very Rev. Dr. Glass, president of the college, will preach a sermon on "Christian Education." Monday evening the graduating exercises

will be held in the Father Meyer Memorial hall of the college. Bishop Conaty will preside and present the diplomas. On Tuesday evening "The Bells," a three-act drama, will be presented by the students of the college.

The Sacred Heart school, East Los Angeles, will hold commencement exercises Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. A unique feature of the exercises will be that they will be held in the convent gardens.

The forty hours' adoration service will begin at the Plaza church tomorrow with morning high mass at 11 o'clock. Rev. J. Caballeria will preach

in English and Rev. J. M. W. Beaudry will preach at the evening service. The adoration will close Tuesday evening.

A class of seventy-five will be confirmed at St. Joseph's church by Bishop Conaty Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. The confirmation class will renew their baptismal vows and receive communion in a body at the 8 o'clock mass. For both services they will be escorted to the church by St. Joseph's Benevolent society and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Benediction will be given following the afternoon service. There will be no evening service.

The feast of St. Aloysius will be observed next Wednesday and that of Corpus Christi next Thursday. The solemnity of the latter feast will be transferred to the following Sunday.

The women of St. Patrick's parish are preparing to give an entertainment Thursday evening, June 22, at Dalton hall.

Commencement exercises of St. Joseph's school will be held Wednesday morning. A solemn mass of thanksgiving will be celebrated at 8 o'clock, followed by exercises in the school hall.
