DISCUSS PLANS FOR NEW ART GALLERY Methods for pushing the much discussed plans for an art gallery that will be worthy of Los Angeles were discussed yesterday morning by representative club women, who held a lively meeting in the Ruskin Art club rooms. Just at present the work of forming an organization that will best further the important movement is the foremost consideration, and Charles Lumis asked the club women to cooperate with the Southwest society of the Archeological Institute of America. EDITORS CONTINUE JOURNEY NORTH CARE FREE SCRIBES BOUND FOR PORTLAND SING PRAISES OF LOS ANGELES Promise to So Advertise the City of Flowers in the East as to Greatly Increase its Population

Gone but not forgotten are the 22 editors with their wives and families, who, after a three days' sojourn in the City of Flowers, left for the north yesterday morning. Every pusher of the pen who was a member of the party swore with uplifted hand before he left the Lankershim hotel, the general local headquarters, that Los Angeles had fairly outdone itself in its entertainment of its guests and that as a result of their work of advertising on their return home the city could be expected to increase in population by 25 per cent within the year. The special train, comprising nine Pullmans and a baggage coach, left the Arcade station at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, bound for Santa Barbara, where the party will enjoy a half day's outing before continuing their journey. As usual, there was the few late ones who arrived in breathless haste and just in time to catch the train ere it started, but the entire company got away amid cheers, laughter and farewell wishes of prosperity both from the visitors and the Angelenos who were at the station to bid them good-by. Following today's visit in Santa Barbara, Thursday will be spent in Del Monte and Monterey, and Friday morning the care-free editors, with no thoughts of editorials and the willful ways of the "cub" reporters, no threatened damage suits and no correspondents' huge expense accounts, will arrive in Santa Cruz in time for a bull's head breakfast. At 4 o'clock the same afternoon they will continue their journey to San Francisco, where, after two days of sightseeing, the party will break up, a number returning to their homes in the east and the remainder continuing their journey north for a week at the Portland exposition.
