NEW LIGHT IS THROWN UPON FLYER ACCIDENT

DEATH LIST NOW NINETEEN

Victims Were Nearly All Prominent in Business and Professional Life in New York and Other Cities

By Associated Press. CLEVELAND, June 22.—It is probable that investigation tomorrow will develop that a boy 14 years old meddled with the switch at the Mentor station last night and caused the wreck of the Twentieth Century flyer.

William Usher, ticket agent of the Nickel Plate, and James Barnes of Willoughby were on the scene of the wreck twenty minutes after it happened. On the way they met a boy carrying a lantern. They questioned him and he said that he had been down to shut a switch. The men went to the scene of the wreck and found the switch open but locked.
