MOURNED LOSS OF MOTHER

Bookkeeper Has Been Despondent Since Recent Bereavement

ST. LOUIS, June 23.—Daniel Healy, aged 35, is bookkeeper in the employ of the J. F. Ewing Salt company of St. Louis, and resides with his only near relative, his sister, who is married, at 4224 Evans avenue. A Herald correspondent tonight called at his home and conveyed as gently as possible to his sister and her husband, who came to the door together, the first news of his attempt to commit suicide. The sister almost fainted. When she had partly recovered from the shock, she said:

"Dan had no reason in the world to attempt suicide. He left St. Louis for Los Angeles last Saturday night well supplied with money, after depositing a substantial sum on which he could draw as he needed more. This is the first news we have had from him since his departure.

"The only reason I can think of for such act is his grief over the loss of our mother, who died April 1. Ever since her death he has been under a physician's care."

WIFE'S CLOTHING WORN BY ANOTHER

STARTLING SIGHT AROUSES HER IRE

SECURES HUSBAND'S ARREST

Mrs. Olive Knibbs Tells Court of Meeting Other Woman Who Was Wearing Her Hat, Dress, Coat and Shoes

It is difficult to imagine what the average woman would do should she meet "the other woman," the woman who had robbed her of a husband's affections, and the situation would not be very much improved should "the other woman" be wearing the hat, dress and other finery purchased for wife by the husband before "the other woman" had charmed him away from home.

But when these particular events crept into the life's experience of Mrs. Olive Knibbs she straightway had her husband arrested and filed suit for divorce. She told the story of this experience on the witness stand yesterday in the following words:

"I was taking a little walk on Broadway one evening when, happening to glance at the woman ahead of me, I noticed that her hat resembled a hat formerly owned by me. I immediately made a close inspection and saw that the woman was the one who had taken my husband from me, and that she was dressed in clothing which had formerly belonged to me and which my husband had taken away when he left my home.

Her Own Clothing

"As soon as I saw that the hat belonged to me I noticed the woman's clothing. Yes, there was my dress, fitting snugly to this other woman's figure, and there was my coat giving her a natty appearance. The woman was just my size. As she started to cross the street she lifted her dress and in a flash I recognized the shoes which she wore as part of my lost property."

Mrs. Knibbs alleged non-support and desertion and Attorney J. Marion Brooks appeared for her. She was the only witness on her own behalf with the exception of Police Officer Ingraham, who testified regarding a recent criminal prosecution of the husband, Norman G. Kribbs.

"I was married in Los Angeles about two years ago," testified Mrs. Knibbs, "and with my husband went to light housekeeping. For awhile all went well, but I soon began to suspect that he was paying attention to another woman. I accused him of it and he admitted to me that he was in love with a young woman who was living at the Preston house. He told me her name was Bessie Clarke, but that she went under the names of Iola Clarke and Minnie Bee.

"I told him that all was over between us and that I would take my furniture and clothes and go to my home on Boyle Heights. He said that if I took the furniture I could not have the clothes, so I left him all the things and went home.

"I then met this woman on the street and when I recognized my clothes I followed her. The woman joined my husband and that settled it. I did not intend having another woman wearing my things. I went to the police station and with an officer I went to my husband and demanded my clothing. He said that the things belonged to him and then the officer arrested him on the criminal charge and he was sentenced to 150 days in jail."

There was no defense offered to the charges, as the husband is serving his 150 day sentence, and she secured a decree of divorce.

PLEADS POVERTY AS EXCUSE

Father Ordered by Court to Support His Children

The divorce suit of Chantry against Chantry was again taken into court yesterday when the defendant in the former case appeared before Judge Bordwell, charged with contempt of court in not paying the money to his children as ordered by court.

At the divorce trial some months ago, Mrs. Chantry was given the decree and the custody of the two children. Yesterday Chantry pleaded that he was making only \$1.50 a day and that he paid \$1.75 for his daily expenses. He claimed to be absolutely without money to provide for his children as ordered by court and alleged that he did not see that his express business would allow him to pay anything for some time to come.

The attorney for the plaintiff was vigorous in scoring Chantry. "This man," said the attorney, "is a big, able bodied man and if he can't make more than \$1.50 a day at working a sick horse in an express wagon he had better carry a hod."

Judge Bordwell ruled that Chantry be compelled to pay \$15 a month for the support of his children and denied the request that the children be kept in Los Angeles.

WIFE PLEADS FOR ALIMONY

A citation for alimony and support was brought yesterday by Mrs. Emma H. Gross against her husband, George L. Gross of Santa Monica. The divorce trial will be held during October and the woman asked for support for herself and daughter until the time of the trial.

Gross alleged that his property was small and that he owed several hundred dollars. He was ordered to pay his wife \$40.

STATISTICS ON HEALTH BY THE STATE BOARD

VITAL DATA IS AN INTERESTING FEATURE

Mortality for Population of 930,350 Reporting Totaled 1187 for Month of May, an Annual Death Rate of 15.31 Per Thousand

The report of the California state board of health for May has been issued and some interesting data is included for the information of the public, the vital statistics being especially interesting. That portion of the report is as follows:

"Twenty-four reports, representing a population of 930,350, show a mortality of 1187 and a death rate for the month of 1.28 per thousand, or an annual rate of 15.31 per thousand. In the public institutions, with a population of 9,465, there were 58 deaths—a monthly death rate of 6.13 per thousand, or an annual rate of 73.61 per thousand.

"The causes of deaths were as follows: Tuberculosis, 202; heart disease, 136; pneumonia, 91; cancer, 83; stomach, 63; diarrhoea and dysentery, 26; typhoid fever, 10; bronchitis, 15; diphtheria, 13; cerebro-spinal fever, 11; alcoholism, 8; whooping cough, 8; influenza, 4; congestion of the lungs, 3; erysipelas, 2; scarlet fever, 1; typhomalarial fevers, 1; other causes, 500.

"Distributed proportionally the deaths from each cause reported per 10,000 from all causes were as follows: Tuberculosis, 1702; heart disease, 1146; pneumonia, 767; cancer, 699; stomach, 631; diarrhoea and dysentery, 219; typhoid fever, 169; bronchitis, 126; diphtheria, 110; cerebro-spinal fever, 93; alcoholism, 67; whooping cough, 67; influenza, 34; congestion of the lungs, 25; erysipelas, 17; scarlet fever, 8; typhomalarial fevers, 8; other causes, 4212."

RECOVERS HIS SANITY; NOW MUST STAND TRIAL

AMOS HERCULES IS BROUGHT FROM ASYLUM

Prisoner Charged With the Murder of Timothy Segrue at Redondo Will Attempt to Prove Himself Innocent of Crime

With shackles on his hands and an Oregon boot attached to his right foot, Amos Hercules, charged with the murder of the information of the Redondo car shops more than a year ago, was brought yesterday to Los Angeles from the Patton asylum by Deputy Sheriff E. H. Hutchinson.

Hercules is a man slightly over medium height and stockily built. The crime with which he is charged occurred during December of 1903. A short time prior to that date Hercules had been discharged from the car shops because he refused to assist the freeman in shoveling coal.

He brooded over his discharge for several days and then went to the car shops and demanded to be taken back. His demand was refused and after appealing to several of his former friends he is alleged to have jumped upon an anvil and drawing his revolver to have fired on the men. Segrue was killed and Hercules was charged with murder. A short time before the trial Hercules showed symptoms of insanity and was tried on that charge. He was committed to Patton, but recovered rapidly and made a request to be brought back for trial. Since his incarceration he had gained more than forty pounds, and instead of the slender man that went to the asylum the officers were surprised when Hercules arrived at the local jail to see him active, energetic and apparently in good health. The accused man will not speak of the charge against him except with his attorneys, but is preparing a vigorous defense. The trial will be held in July.


