

# SANTA FE SUED BY GOVERNMENT

## CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS ARE COMMENCED VIOLATION OF INJUNCTION

It is Alleged That the Company Disobeyed Order Forbidding the Giving of Rebates

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 1.—Contempt proceedings against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway company, charging that company with 'being guilty of the violation of an injunction issued at Kansas City by Judge Phillips on March 24, 1902, restraining the road from giving rebates, was filed in the United States district court here today at the instigation of Milton D. Purdy of Washington, D. C., assistant attorney-general, who came here recently at the direction of the attorney general to file the suit upon behalf of the government.

Although Judge Phillips' restraining order, issued three years ago, was directed against seven other railroad companies besides the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, the suit filed today is solely against the latter road. The other railroads enjoined previously by Judge Phillips were the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, Chicago & Alton, Missouri Pacific, the Wabash, Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific and the Chicago, Great Western. A similar order was issued by Judge Grosscup in Chicago on March 25, 1902, against six other roads.

The suit filed today at the instigation of the federal government recites that the Santa Fe railway up to the time the injunction was granted had been engaged in the practice of granting unlawful rebates and preferential rates and facilities to certain favored shippers on traffic in packing house products, dressed meats, grain and the products of grain, which were not granted to the public generally, and that the Santa Fe railroad had also been granting unlawful rebates and facilities to certain other favored shippers on many other of the principal commodities which constituted and comprised the ordinary necessities of life.

The information, after noting the issuance of the restraining order of March 24, 1902, says that between March 26, 1902, and November 27, 1904, the Santa Fe railway company and its officers and agents unlawfully, willfully and knowingly violated and disregarded the said restraining order.

The information asserts specifically that the Santa Fe favored the Colorado Fuel & Iron company in giving rates on coal, saying it carried the coal of said company "at a less rate than the rates named for such services in defendants published and established schedules and granted and paid rebates to said Colorado Fuel & Iron company."

The information asserts that the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway is in contempt "for the willful and repeated violations of said temporary restraining order," and asks the federal court to cite the company's officials to appear in court and make answer for such acts.

Judge Phillips did not indicate today what action he might take in the matter.

### ENTOMOLOGIST FINDS SCALE KILLING SPRAY

Berkeley Expert Discovers Method of Destroying Pest on Apricot Trees

By Associated Press. BERKELEY, July 1.—Success in the search for powerful sprays for the brown apricot scale and the well known San Jose scale is reported by H. J. Quale, assistant entomologist in the agricultural department of the University of California, who has published a bulletin describing experiments which were conducted under his direction in co-operation with the Kings county board of horticulture and the fruit growers in the neighborhood of Hanford.

The most destructive pest in Kings county at present is the brown apricot scale which, although unknown there four years ago, has now taken a firm foothold on the fruit trees, thriving, however, not so much on the apricot as on the prune.

Entomologist Quale found that the familiar "resin compound" was not only partially effective of the San Jose scale but immensely satisfactory in the case of the brown apricot scale.

The old "lime-sulphur-salt" wash Quale found to be the most effective remedy for the San Jose scale, but of little use for the brown apricot scale.

### REPORTS GREAT FLOOD

Seattle Hears of Devastation in the Valdez Region

SEATTLE, July 1.—Disastrous floods in the neighborhood of Valdez are reported in special cable advices received today from the north. There has been no loss of life, but fifty cabins were swept away and fully a mile of telegraph poles washed out. The reports indicate that the raging streams threaten still further trouble.

To all appearances the fires inland and along the lower Yukon are still raging as fiercely as ever. Full details of property destroyed have not been obtained to date.

### ART MUSEUM IS OPENED

St. Louis Palace Formally Given to the Public

LOUIS, July 1.—The west pavilion of the stone building known during the Louisiana Purchase exposition as the Palace of Fine Arts was today formally opened to the public as the St. Louis museum, embracing in the thirty-six rooms collections of exhibits from forty different countries, valued collectively at \$500,000.

It is the expressed purpose of the directors to make the museum a public educational center. It is stated that the collection of exhibits shown could not have been made in less than ten years had it not been for the world's fair and the lavish gifts of the representatives of foreign countries.

### HILL DESERTS HIS CHAUFFEUR IN COURT

#### SAYS THAT MAN DISREGARDED ALL ORDERS

Son of Railway Magnate Hopes Judge Will Inflict Heavy Penalty on Man Who Ran Down and Killed an Unidentified Woman

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, July 1.—Frank C. Foote, a chauffeur employed by James N. Hill, son of J. J. Hill, the capitalist, is still under arrest in connection with the death of an unidentified woman killed by the Hill auto yesterday in Greenwich avenue. Foote was on his way to court to answer charges of speeding when the fatal accident occurred.

When remanded to the coroner and held in \$5000 bail the chauffeur appealed to his employer to furnish bonds for him, but Mr. Hill refused, saying that he should leave the court to deal with him, as he had taken out the automobile without permission. The machine was moving very slowly when it ran down the unknown victim in front of a public school and in full view of many pupils.

"When I bought the automobile and employed Foote ten days ago I made only two conditions with him," said Mr. Hill. "The first was that he should never take the machine out of the garage without my permission, and the other was that he should never run at fast speed in the city under any circumstances. He violated both rules within a few days.

"I hope the court will deal as severely as possible with him and will make an example of him."

### HOTTMAN RECEIVES SENTENCE OF DEATH

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, July 1.—Frank Hottman, convicted of complicity in the murder of Clarence Meyers, was sentenced to be hanged August 10. Mrs. Meyers is also under sentence of death. An appeal in each case will act as a

stay of execution. Hottman wept today when sentence was pronounced. Last week when sentence was passed upon Mrs. Meyers she smiled and made no show of emotion.

### MRS. COLLINS PROVES SHE IS LEGAL WIFE

San Francisco Attorney Ordered to Pay Alimony of One Hundred Dollars a Month

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—Mrs. Charlotte E. Collins, the repudiated and disowned wife of Attorney George D. Collins, last night proved her marriage by ample documentary and oral evidence, and Superior Judge Graham made an order directing Collins to pay her alimony at the rate of \$100 a month. The order is not a final one. It stands only pending the determination of the suit for maintenance. The proof consisted of the city and county records and the sworn testimony of Mrs. Collins herself, William Newman, her brother, and Florence Newman, her sister, the two latter of whom were both at the wedding.

Mrs. Collins testified that her husband had called upon her and asked her to deny that she was his wife. The court now found: That plaintiff and defendant intermarried May 15, 1889, and ever since have been and are husband and wife; that the issue of said marriage is three children, that defendant willfully and without cause deserted and abandoned plaintiff on the 6th of May, 1895.

Collins was not present.
