

CLERGY PREPARE TO TAKE VACATION

CHURCH SERVICES WILL NOT BE DISTURBED

EXODUS BEGINS NEXT MONTH

Many Plan to Visit the East, a Few Will Go Abroad, While Others Will Recreate Nearer Home

As the warmer weather of summer approaches in earnest the clergymen of the City of the Angels are arranging to hie themselves to the mountain and beach resorts to spend their vacations.

The shepherds of the flocks will be absent, but the church work will in nowise be discontinued. The pulpits will be supplied by visiting clergymen, committees having been appointed for this purpose in the different churches.

The clergymen, as a rule, spend their vacations at mountain or beach resorts in quiet enjoyment. Others will visit the Portland fair and put in their time sight seeing in the north.

Several of the prominent clergymen of this city have already gone to Europe for their vacations, prominent among whom are Rev. Robert J. Burdette, pastor of Temple Baptist church, who will attend the Baptist world convention in London.

Rev. Joseph Barron, rector of St. Mary's church, left some time ago for Europe, and is now in Italy. He will tour Europe and the Holy land before his return in the fall.

Bishop Conaty, an example of the strenuous life, but an apostle of the simple life, is planning work which will keep him in town until his trip to Rome the latter part of August or early in September, when he will have an audience with the pope.

Monsignor P. Harnett, pastor of the Cathedral of St. Vibiana and vicar general of the diocese, says that he thinks his long European trip of last year will have sufficed for his summer vacation this year.

sin spoke on "Character," basing it upon the ten commandments, which he pointed out separately in a clear and concise manner. He said: "Good moral character is all that God asks. While it may sound loose in orthodox, it is all God can ask and be a just God.

"After the fall of Adam, God never saw his ideal until the incarnate word was made flesh, Jesus Christ being the second Adam. You are a second Adam if sin has never stained your personality, but if it has, you are not saved. This is not a matter of opinion. God never left this business on your opinion. He has revealed to us his opinion. Men change their opinions. God could not leave the salvation of the world on so flimsy a thing as man's opinion.

"God has given us a law, and seeks to demand of you what you ought to be for your own good, and he has ten-yard sticks by which to measure you. No man who is honest for honesty's sake is any good. Many of you would be doing a whole lot of devilry if Uncle Sam wasn't after you. God wants you to be right in the motive.

"I beg of you in the good name of fair America, the home of the brave and the free, for God's sake as a nation, let's rid ourselves of false representation of God.

"Some say that if a man keeps nine commandments and breaks one, and is damned for that one, it is not fair. Suppose you, honey, have a chain. Nine links are good and if you are suspended between heaven and hell, your nine links hold, while the tenth breaks, you go ca-whoop to hell. Your chain isn't long enough to reach God. You had better turn to the red hot Calvary and let God make you a chain from the forge of Gethsemane."

MINISTER DEPARTS FROM ORDINARY CHURCH CUSTOM

Will Soon Administer Baptismal Rites to Persons Not Willing to Unite With Congregation

Rev. Joseph Smale, pastor of the First Baptist church, has broken the regular rules of that denomination regarding the old perpendicular idea of baptism. He affirmed yesterday morning at the close of the service, that baptism is not confined to a church ordinance and that the authority of the ministry does not issue from the church but from God. To substantiate the idea of changing the rule of baptism, Rev. Mr. Smale stated that through the sanction of his church he will soon baptize one member of the Methodist church of this city; also a person that does not belong to any church and does not intend uniting with any church denomination.

Yesterday was the beginning of the sixth week of prayer and revival services at this church. These services are resulting in many conversions and additions to the church.

Rev. Mr. Smale preached yesterday morning and evening on "The Triumphant Life." At the morning service he said in part:

"Here we are with a heritage left us by the forefathers of the church. The result is that we are afflicted with a traditional system of life. Human accretions have gathered around the organized fellowship of Christ which have been working much harm to the church.

"Christ is the only authentic organizer of the church, but the church has incorporated with its circle many harmful auxiliaries. I do not sanction any auxiliaries outside or inside of the church and I contend that the church does not need them. They dictate to the church and threaten its existence. "Another prominent factor in church worship is that denominational contention should not be tolerated. We are inclined to organize a half dozen

SAYS WOMAN MUST ELEVATE MANKIND

DR. TYNDALL DISCOURSES ON EQUAL SUFFRAGE

BALLOT IS COMMON GROUND

Well Known Psychologist Declares Gentle Sex Represents to Human Race What Soul Does to the World


"The Psychology of Woman's Rights" was the subject of Dr. Alexander J. McIvor-Tyndall's psychological discourse at Blanchard hall last evening and it proved to be one of extraordinary popularity. The hall was filled long before 8 o'clock, the audience being composed of representative men and women, all eager to hear the question of woman's rights as viewed from the standpoint of the psychologist rather than that of the politician.

Dr. McIvor-Tyndall evidently believes that womankind, considered from the viewpoint of sex, rather than from the individual standard, is farther along in the scale of evolution than is man, since she represents the higher and more spiritual part of the human race. Dr. McIvor-Tyndall said:

Psychological Cause "All great national or world movements are the result of a psychological cause. We have named this action of the psychic forces 'evolution,' but the word evolution means something infinitely more to the metaphysician than it does to the materialist. This question of the enfranchisement of woman, therefore, is not merely a political question. It is a psychological one. The important part which women are taking in the world's work is not of their own seeking. They are complying with the invisible force that ever urges humankind onward to soul consciousness. Throughout all history we may observe spasmodic attempts to equalize the sexes, and again to establish equality of races. Hitherto, these attempts at sex equality have been based upon woman's claim to be man's equal in intelligence.

World's Idea of Things "The world's idea of intelligence and ability has been gauged by materialistic standards. From a strictly physical viewpoint woman is not man's equal. From the larger viewpoint that takes in to account the higher soul attributes, woman is far more advanced than man, because she has risen above the materialism of the centuries and has reached the higher plane of soul consciousness. This is, naturally, an abstract statement. That it does not apply to each and every woman and every man is self evident. It is naturally a question of averages. Soul consciousness (real advancement or perception of truth) is in the end a matter of individual growth, regardless of sex,
