STATE WITNESSES APPEAR CONFUSED

LITTLE HEADWAY MADE IN HOOK TRIAL

MOTORMAN GIVES TESTIMONY

Says That the Machine Traveled Two Blocks in Less Than a Minute, but Lawyer Wins His Point

In the trial yesterday of Barbe Hook, the young automobilist charged with manslaughter, little headway was made by the prosecution. Witnesses for the state seemed to be confused by the questions of Hook's attorneys. Several witnesses were called only to fumble their evidence and seemingly forget what they were talking about, while the trial dragged slowly along. Van Horn, a motorman for the Los Angeles Railway company, was the first witness. He testified to the speed of the auto at the time of the accident. He was positive that the machine traveled two blocks in less than a minute, until Attorney Reeves, for the defense, gave him a simple problem of division, and then, after an embarrassed silence of several seconds, he was forced to admit defeat. J. M. McLoyd, conductor of the car upon which Miss Birtwistle had been a passenger, was the second witness. McLoyd started his testimony as though he meant well, but his recollection of the location of the car at the time of the accident appeared to be hazy and his evidence to the effect that when Miss Birtwistle left the car she dashed around the rear platform and with head slightly bowed and holding her jacket hurried across the street directly in the path of the auto, may prove of value to the defense. McLoyd further testified that one of the young women in the automobile screamed frantically just before the accident, which he said should have been a warning to the endangered pedestrian. During the entire testimony Hook sat by his mother, paying strict attention to the witnesses. It is expected that Miss Frankie Babler will be called to testify today for the prosecution and evidence for that side will probably be closed this evening.

COUNCIL GOES SLOW WITH CITY OWNERSHIP

Expert Electrician May Be Hired to Prepare Specifications and Estimate Municipal ownership of lighting plants was discussed by the special municipal ownership committee of the council yesterday. Secretary Willard of the Municipal league addressed the committee on the advisability of adopting some plan by which the city could acquire its own lighting plant. The municipal ownership committee originally consisted of Blanchard, Healy and the Sixth ward member. When the mayor's proposition for buying a municipal gas plant was before the council the committee was increased to five members, Kern and Smith being added. After considerable discussion the committee decided to ask the council, next Monday, to hire an expert electrician to prepare plans, specifications and estimate for a municipal plant suitable for the lighting of Los Angeles. The member from the Sixth ward offered to name the expert, but the committee thought differently. When Mayor McAleer proposed a scheme by which the city might obtain, without the necessity of a bond issue, a municipal gas plant, he of the goggles bitterly opposed the measure. Just what view of the proposed investigation the council will take has not at the present time been stated, but it is considered probable that action will be deferred until the next municipal election. Councilman Smith of the Fifth ward has put himself on record several times as favoring the submission of the municipal ownership question to the people of the city at that time. Other councilmen agree with him in this view.

LIGHTING MEASURE IS PASSED OVER VETO

Council Provides for Illumination of Spring Street Against the Mayor's Opposition

By a vote of six to one the council passed the Spring street lighting ordinance over Mayor McAleer's veto yesterday. There was some discussion as to the ordinance being lawfully passed by six votes, but City Attorney Mathews ruled that as it did not call for the expenditure of public money, six votes put it into effect lawfully. Secretary Willard of the Municipal league addressed the council on behalf of the league, and said his organization was in favor of sustaining the mayor in his present veto and passing the ordinance as it was originally drawn. Secretary Lissner of the Spring Street Improvement association asked the council to adopt any ordinance, just so Spring street would be lighted immediately. Thereupon the vote was taken.
