By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—A hurricane battle is looked for when Jimmy Britt faces Kid Sullivan at Woodward's pavilion tonight. Britt will defend the lightweight title against the aspirations of the Baltimore boy, Sullivan's admirers have increased in number every day. Britt is always known to be in the best of condition. In fact he generally has a bit on his opponent as far as downright physical condition is concerned, but tonight Jimmy cannot count on an advantage in this respect. Sullivan is certainly the more of physical perfection. When he started training a few weeks ago he was in good trim, and two weeks and a half of constant grind has increased his wonderful muscular development twofold. The Baltimore boxer will weigh every ounce of 133 pounds when he enters the ring tonight. And it will all be good, hard, sound, fighting flesh. He weighed 134 1/2 pounds when he ceased active gym work Tuesday. Sullivan is confident that he will be able to bring over the sleep-producing wallow and is prepared to put up the battle of his life when he hooks up with the native son.

JURY DISAGREES IN LAND FRAUD TRIAL
TWO ONLY ARE IN FAVOR OF ACQUITTAL

Case Against Congressman Williamson, Van Gesner and Commissioner Biggs in Jury Being Able to Concur—New Trial at Once Started

PORTLAND, July 20.—After being closeted together for forty-six hours and taking forty-two ballots, in which the vote was ten for conviction and two for acquittal, the jury in the case of Congressman Williamson, Dr. Van Gesner and United States Commissioner Biggs reported to Judge De Haven in the United States district court this afternoon that it could not agree, and it was discharged. Judge De Haven asked each juror individually if there was any hope for an agreement, to which each responded that there was not. The court then ordered the clerk to enter an order of dismissal. District Attorney Heney stated that he would like to try the Williamson case over again, whereupon Judge De Haven set the case for tomorrow. Judge Bennett for the defense was much averse to going to trial at once, and pleaded for time in which to "get ourselves together," but Judge De Haven said the case would be set for tomorrow. The work of impaneling a jury will then begin, and by the time this is done the witnesses will be on hand. On entering the court room Judge De Haven asked the jury if they had arrived at a verdict. Foreman Hilke said it had not and that there appeared to be no prospect that one would be reached. Judge De Haven asked if the jury understood that they could find one defendant innocent and the jurors said they did. W. O. Cook then addressed the court, saying that the jury had balloted several times with the same result, that each man had taken a part in the discussion, and that it was evident no verdict could be reached. Judge De Haven then dismissed the jury from further attendance upon the court. The two jurors who stood out against the majority were for acquittal or compromise. It has been ascertained that W. O. Cook, who was supposed for a long time to have stood out alone for acquittal, was favorable to the government.
