

80,000 PER CENT PROFIT IN REMEDY BOARD OF HEALTH FIGURES ON LIQOZONE

MAKE ANALYSIS OF "CUREALL"

City Chemist Furnishes Interesting Data on Subject of Adulterated Food Stuffs—Garbage Question Up Again

Eighty thousand per cent is the profit the Ligozone company makes on the sale of the "cureall" by that name, according to computations made last night by the members of the board of health.

City Chemist Miller reported that the medicine was composed of sulphuric, sulphuric acids and water. W. H. Johnson, attorney for the Ligozone company, appeared before the board and offered to make any changes the board should ask for.

Dr. Kurtz figured that in each dose of Ligozone of one teaspoonful there were five drops of sulphuric acid and that if this dose was repeated too often it would rust the stomach. Mr. Johnson offered to put a warning on the label to protect the sick from becoming rusty on the inside.

It was then that the computation was made which indicated that the product cost to make about one cent per gallon and that it sold for fifty cents per eight-ounce bottle, or \$8 per gallon. The board took the question under advisement.

Garbage Question Again

The old question of garbage that will never down popped up again last night and the health commissioners wanted to know what Garbage Contractor Alexander was doing toward earning the \$2,840 per month allowed him by the council. Originally he was allowed \$1,790, but recently he was handed an additional \$450 for collecting from the hospitals. Commissioner Kurtz declared that Alexander did not collect from the California hospital and Commissioner Salisbury said he was equally neglectful with regard to the Good Samaritan hospital.

The board recommended a chicken ordinance to the council. This ordinance is designed to protect the flower beds of the citizens from chickens belonging to their next door neighbors.

An ordinance prohibiting the use of preservatives in all food was also recommended to the council. The board of health intend to use every effort to protect the people of the city against adulterated or "doctored" food stuffs.

SANTA FE PREPARING FOR TOURIST TRAFFIC

Roadbeds Are Being Ballasted and Heavier Locomotives Built for Pacific Division

General Superintendent I. L. Hibbard of the Santa Fe returned yesterday from an inspection trip to Albuquerque. Mr. Hibbard says that a large amount of work is being done on the coast lines this summer to place everything in the best possible condition for the heavy tourist travel expected during the coming winter.

Much of the road bed is being ballasted anew and considerable work is being done on the Grand Canyon branch.

Within the next three months the Santa Fe will have placed on the lines between Los Angeles and Albuquerque fifty of the most powerful locomotives that engineering skill can construct. Twenty of these are locomotives of the 900 class freighters and will be used exclusively on the Albuquerque division. The remaining thirty are passenger engines of the Pacific balanced compound type, a number of which will be used out of Los Angeles.

ACCUSE DR. DUNN OF "LEAKING" INFORMATION

LATEST PHASE OF THE DENTAL BOARD INQUIRY

It is Alleged that Accused Gave Out in Advance Questions in Anatomy Examination to a Young Man Who Was in His Employ

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—A complete surprise was sprung in the investigation of the alleged irregular actions of the state dental board today when those members of the board known as the "solid five"—A. B. Mayhew, C. A. Herrick, G. A. White, E. J. Howard and F. G. Baird—brought forward testimony which directly accused Dr. J. M. Dunn, one of the opposing faction in the board, with giving out some of the questions in anatomy to a young man in his employ who was about to take the test so that he could apply for a dentist's license.

This young man is Dr. Richard D. Papandre and he says in a sworn affidavit that he was given three or four questions by his employer, a member of the state board. To back up this testimony the "solid five" introduced Dr. George D. O'Connell, who stated before a committee that Papandre gave him these questions a few minutes before the examination and that four of them were embodied in the questions written on the board by Dr. Mayhew. He, too, had made an affidavit swearing to these facts.

Dr. Dunn denies that he gave the questions to Papandre. "I was only joking with him and gave him one josh question that is common for dentists to pass to a young student. I am not guilty of having given away the questions. Nor do I believe that Dr. Mayhew did it. Of course I have not heard all the testimony, but I believe that all the questions which the boys had were general ones and that there was no irregularity at all. Dr. Cool had his suspicions because of the decided similarity between the real examination questions and the list obtained in advance by Dr. Smith."

TIVERTON BEATEN BY SWEET MARIE

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA MARE WINS AT READVILLE

STEPS MILE IN 2:04 3-4

Garland's Great Trotter Defeats Her Old rival in \$5000 Stake Race. Establishes Record for Three-Heat Event

By Associated Press. READVILLE, Mass., Aug. 3.—California and New York met today at the Readville track and when the contest for speed ended the honors were awarded to the Pacific slope. In one of the finest harness contests ever seen on any race course Sweet Marie defeated Tiverton two out of three heats, thereby winning for her owner a purse of \$5000. William Garland of Los Angeles, owner of Sweet Marie, 2:04 3/4, and A. B. Gwathney of New York, owner of Tiverton, 2:04 1/2, the two crack trotters of last year, two months ago matched their horses for \$5000.

It was exactly 2:30 o'clock this afternoon when Alta McDonald, behind Sweet Marie, and John Howell, with Tiverton, appeared for the first heat, the latter getting the pole on the toss. After two preliminary scores all was in readiness and the first time down they got the word, with Tiverton a saddle girth in the lead. This advantage he increased until he swung down the stretch for home, when Sweet Marie reached his wheel, but the gelding won handsly by half a length. Sweet Marie was under a hard drive. The time, 2:05 1/2, was the trotting record of the

year, beating that of Dr. Strong at Detroit last week by half a second.

Sweet Marie Equals Her Record

In the second heat McDonald had Sweet Marie right on her stride and went away with Tiverton at a whirlwind gait. For a few strides the mare showed in front and then the gelding forged ahead, leading at the quarter by a length. This time McDonald made his drive earlier, reaching Tiverton at the three-quarters. BISHOP MORA DIES IN SPAIN

CABLEGRAM ANNOUNCES HIS DEMISE

PASSES AWAY AT OLD HOME

Local Catholics Recall His Services of Nearly a Quarter of Century in Diocese of Monterey and Los Angeles

A cablegram was received yesterday by Rt. Rev. Bishop Conaty announcing the death of Rt. Rev. Bishop Francis Mora, former bishop of the diocese of Monterey and Los Angeles, at Barcelona, Spain, yesterday morning. His death occurred on the thirty-second anniversary of his consecration as bishop.

Bishop Mora came to America in 1854. He was sent by Bishop Amat to St. Mary's seminary, Perryville, Mo., to pursue a course in theology.

He was called to California in 1856 and was ordained at the Church of Our Lady of Angels March 19 of that year. His first appointment was at Monterey, after being stationed a few months at San Juan Bautista. In 1860 he was sent to Pajaro and in 1868 was appointed pastor of the Plaza church. Three years later he was appointed vicar general and in 1871 made his first trip to Europe, being sent by the bishop on business connected with the diocese.

Consecrated in 1873

Bishop Amat applied to Rome for a coadjutor and Father Mora was appointed May 20, 1873, being consecrated bishop in the Plaza church August 3, 1873. He succeeded Bishop Amat May 12, 1878.

After several years his health failing, he applied for a coadjutor, Father Montgomery, now archbishop of San Francisco, being appointed. In 1896 his resignation was accepted and he returned to Barcelona, Spain, where he has passed his last years with his childhood friends.

Bishop Conaty will celebrate pontifical requiem mass for the repose of his soul next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Cathedral of St. Vibiana.
