

GARDNER WINS IN ELEVENTH

RUFÉ TURNER KNOCKED OUT AT COLMA

RIGHT TO WIND DOES IT

Black Boy Shows Well in the First Two Rounds, but is Unable to Stand Pace—Gardner's Cleverness

By Associated Press. COLMA, Cal., Aug. 4.—The largest crowd by far in the history of the Golden State Athletic association crowded the pavilion here this evening to witness the scheduled twenty-five-round contest between Jimmie Gardner and Rufe Turner.

Fight by Rounds Round 1—Gardner landed a stiff left to the body. Turner was short with a hard left to the wind.

Round 2—Turner landed a light left to the face. In a mixup they exchanged lefts to the face. Gardner landed a light left to the face.

Round 3—Gardner landed a hard right to the head and was fighting with more confidence. Turner landed a terrific right to the face.

Round 4—Gardner landed several hard lefts to the nose which brought the claret profusely. The round ended in a mix in the center of the ring in which Gardner had all the best of it.

Round 5—Gardner landed hard right on mouth which sent Turner's head back. Turner rushed, but was stopped with hard left to the mouth.

Round 6—Turner forced the fighting, but did no damage. They exchanged stiff lefts to the face.

Round 7—They exchanged several light body punches without much

steam behind them. The round ended in a mix-up in the center of the ring with honors even.

Round 8—Turner reached the head with a light left. They clinched, with no damage. Gardner did some beautiful blocking.

Round 9—Gardner landed a light left to the head and forced the fighting. They engaged in some more rough tactics just before the bell.

Round 10—Both indulged in some tame infighting. Referee Roche having considerable difficulty in separating them. Gardner landed two hard lefts to the wind and a hard left to the face.

Round 11—Gardner knocked Turner out in the beginning of the round with a clean right to the wind.

PARSONS BREAKS RECORD AT PORTLAND GAMES

Southern California Boy Wins Hundred-Yard Dash in Ten Seconds Flat

By Associated Press. PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—The Multnomah Amateur Athletic club team won the junior A. A. U. meet at the fair grounds today when they scored 69 points to 26 for their nearest competitor, the Olympic club of San Francisco.

Parsons of the Olympic club broke the record for 100 yards by clipping two-fifths of a second off the junior mark, doing the distance in ten seconds. A. C. Gilbert of the Multnomah club vaulted 11 feet 1 inch, which is one inch better than the A. A. U. previous junior mark.

BUNDY MEETS DEFEAT ON THE OCEAN PARK COURTS

Overton won on his merits, showing the benefit of coolness and greater court experience than Bundy. Bundy didn't win, but he certainly has the making of a future title holder.
