SCIENTIFIC BALL HAS CHANGED GAME. DUTIES OF PLAYERS HAVE BEEN TRANSFORMED. MEN COVER MORE TERRITORY. All Players Except Pitcher Do More Work Now Than They Did a Decade Ago—Baseball Notes.

The changes in the football rules for 1905, of which there are quite a number, for the most part bear upon more strict interpretation rather than anything that will affect the detail of the play itself.

Under Rule 6, relating to a scrimmage, a distinction has been made between an act of the snapper-back and an act of any other player of the side in possession of the ball.

Coaching from the side lines is now to be penalized by a loss of ten yards instead of five. In order to make definite what a captain might request in the way of the giving of time, a new rule has been appended to the rule which states that the linesman shall notify the captains of the time remaining to play not more than ten nor less than five minutes before the end of each half.
