ORATORIO "ST. PAUL" IS SUNG TO BIG AUDIENCE

CHORUS WORK A SUCCESS

Mme. Johnstone-Bishop, Miss Heardt, Mr. Leeman and Mr. England Are Heard in Solo Parts

Part of Mendelssohn's beautiful oratorio "St. Paul" was sung last evening before an audience of nearly 2000, assembled in the big auditorium at Venice.

A greater part of the audience occupied the gallery, which was reserved for the holders of season tickets, and for that reason the house had a top heavy appearance.

Before the performance the pier presented a most attractive scene, for promenaders in full dress watched the eclipse of the moon while they waited for the opening of the auditorium.

Success of the Oratorio From a social point of view, the oratorio was a success; from a musical point of view, it offered many surprises.

The soloists were received with much cordiality. Madame Johnstone-Bishop was compelled to divide the honors with Miss Estelle Catherine Heart, Ernest Reginald Leeman and Paul England.

Miss Heardt's Reception Miss Heardt enjoyed a special triumph that must have been doubly pleasant, coming as it did after a somewhat cold greeting.

Mr. Leeman, the tenor, won the audience. He has a voice of beautiful quality and he sings with much intelligence. Mr. England brought to his part the artistic training which enabled him to adhere strictly to the traditions of oratorio.

R. Blomquist, first bass, and A. T. Van Sickle, second bass, contributed to what was a fairly satisfactory presentation of the oratorio. Frank H. Colby, the organist, did brilliant service, and to him both chorus and orchestra owe much, for he covered the weak places. Arend's Venice orchestra proved equal to the demands upon it, after more or less uncertainty in the overture.
