CHORAL LEADERS
CALL OFF TRUCE
MUSICAL WAR TO CONTINUE
INDEFINITELY
RIVAL CONCERTS ANNOUNCED

Messrs. Jahn and Barnhart Cease
Negotiations for Peace and
Agree Upon a War of
Extermination

Peace overtures between the two
rival choral clubs of Los Angeles have
ceased.

The Los Angeles Choral club, under
the direction of Prof. Julius Albert
Jahn, and the Apollo club, under the
direction of Harry H. Barnhart, have
agreed to ignore each other and let
each prove its right to be the only one.

Announcement was made yesterday
by each of the directors that his chorus
will present "The Messiah" during
Christmas week. The leader of the
Apollo club has gone one point farther
and announces December 23 as the date
and also announces the names of the
soloists who have been engaged.

Each club is prepared to work as if
the other did not exist.

Mr. Jahn, believing that there is
room for only one club and not willing
to let that one be controlled by Mr.
Barnhart, offered to resign his position
as leader of the Apollo club, a third
person being chosen to unite the
clubs.

Negotiations Off
Mr. Jahn directed a letter to Mr.
Barnhart, but received no answer and
negotiations ceased.

"I saw nothing to answer in Mr.
Jahn's letter," said Mr. Barnhart last
evening, "and so made no reply.

"I do not propose to resign my position,
and I know that before long there
will be only one choral club in Los
Angeles. If there is a choral society
alive, full of enthusiasm, always re-
ceiving new applicants and living up
to choral rules, there will be only one
chorus."

BATTLING NELSON
TRAINING HARD
IS A HORSE FOR WORK, SAY
SPORTS
HAS HIS CAMP AT METZER'S

is Training Off Eleven and a Half
Pounds and Says It Will
Be Easy—Measurements
Are Equal

Sports who have been to San Fran-
cisco to watch Nelson and Britt at
their training quarters say that to
spend a day at Battling Nelson's train-
ing camp at Larkspur, Cal., is an out-
ing by which much may be learned,
pugilistically. When the day is over
one wonders how a little man like Nel-
son can go through such an immense
amount of work.

It has been one big hustle with Nel-
son since he returned from the Sierras.
There was no limbering up process
with him. He went at his training
stunts as if they were play from the
very beginning. It is at "Smiling"
Metzer's roadhouse that Nelson's camp
is pitched. The Dane has trained there
for all his "Frisco battles, and on not
one occasion has he broken up camp
to enter the ring without being exactly
at weight and in fine condition. When
he jumped on the scales at Metzer's
preparatory to hitting the road for
the first time, he tipped the beam at
146 1/2 pounds. He was apparently as
hard as nails after his hunting trip in
northern California and Nevada and
without an ounce of superfluous flesh
on him.

Will Make Weight
"How are you going to strike the 152
notch?" asked a bystander.

"That's a pipe," answered Nelson.
"Only thirteen and a half pounds. That
will simply roll off in a week or two.
When I started to train for my last
fight with young Corbett I weighed 150
and made the necessary mark without
trouble. This will be a cinch.

When one stops to compare the mea-
surements of Britt and Nelson there is
little to choose between the two. There
is a scant difference in their height,
which appears less when the men are
in the ring because of the tendency of
the Dane to drop his head between his
shoulders. In the matter of reach
Nelson has a slight advantage if the
measurement of arms outstretched from
finger tip to finger tip is any crite-
rion. But the Dane has a slightly
bigger chest development and that ac-
counts for the difference in reach and
really makes no difference when the
two are in the ring. Beyond the fact
that he is but 25 inches around the
waist while Britt is 28 inches, the Dane
is almost the counterpart of the Cal-
ifornian.
