TRAINS AT SAN FRANCISCO

McCary Feels No Alarm at Threatening Attitude of City Officials and Continues Preparations for Bout

WRIGHT WILL MEET WARD FOR NATIONAL HONORS

Winners of National Doubles in Tennis to Contest With Each Other for Singles

NEWPORT, Aug. 30.—Beals C. Wright of Boston, by defeating Clarence Hobart of New York today in straight sets, 6-4, 6-1, 6-5, won the honor of meeting Holcomb Ward of Orange, N. J., for the national tennis championship in singles tomorrow. Ward and Wright successfully defended the championship in doubles last Wednesday. They were members of the American team which went to England in the quest for the Davis cup and they have been in nearly every championship event for many years.

Today's match was played under lowering skies. The weather, however, improved and the contest ended in a burst of sunlight. The result was anticipated and there were few periods when there was any doubt as to the outcome. The spectators were given a grand exhibition of net play, fierce cross court drives and back and fore hand dashes by Wright in the second set. Hobart was fairly smothered by the swiftness with which the balls came across the net.


IRWIN'S EYE BLACKED IN A TRAINING BOUT

M'CREEDIE WANTS MORLEY PUT OUT

ACTING PRESIDENT TALKS "SASSY" AT 'FRISCO

Says He Will Wait to Hear From Officials Before Being Overcome With Anxiety—What McCreddie Says

Acting President McCreddie of the Pacific Coast league has taken occasion to vent some of the spite he holds towards Magnate Morley of the Los Angeles club, and some of the fans who are not aware that there is little Damon and Pythias business between McCreddie and Morley are alarmed at the statement that has come out of the wild and woolly north that Morley will not be at the head of the Angels next season.

President Bert was ill and, not being able to wield the gavel at the annual meeting of the league at Portland last week, that duty was delegated to McCreddie. Morley was too busy to attend the annual meeting and sent his proxy by Uncle Henry Harris. Morley says he was too busy to attend that meeting, and there is no reason to doubt his word, but some of the knowing ones suspect that the fact that McCreddie occupied the chair may have had something to do with the pressing nature of Morley's business. It was almost a foregone conclusion that the Los Angeles magnate would have received but little consideration from McCreddie if he had attended the meeting, and as Morley will not submit to a snub without vigorous protest, some friction may have been avoided by his absence. But this gave McCreddie the chance of his life to haul out the little mallet that he keeps especially for Jim Morley, and when he reached San Francisco the aforesaid mallet was in full swing.

What McCreddie Says
A reporter for a San Francisco evening paper got hold of the acting president when he was evidently feeling the worst and quotes him as follows:
"At the close of the present year the Los Angeles franchise will be at the disposal of the league, and it is decidedly an open question as to whether or not Jim Morley will get the plum. There is considerable opposition to the southern magnate in the league at the present time, and the chances are that some one else besides Morley will be awarded the Los Angeles franchise. The league directors did not like Morley's action in ignoring the meeting by not sending his proxy. A considerable business of importance was to be transacted, of which Manager Morley was fully aware, the rest of the board looked for some action on the part of the Southern California club's manager."

"Of course Los Angeles will be in the league next year, but some one else besides Jim Morley will be at the head of affairs. This is not the only time that Morley has offended certain of the league directors by his actions, and when he failed to put in his application for the franchise and totally ignored the whole matter, the members of the board decided to round him up with a sharp turn."

Morley is not alarmed and when the matter was brought to his attention yesterday one of his wags, pale smiles swept across his countenance and he stated that he did not believe the story that he would be refused a franchise and would take no stock in it until he heard from the league officials. He further stated that he did not know that applications for franchises would be made at the Portland meeting.

Under the management of Morley the Los Angeles club has attained a success that it had never before enjoyed, and he has grown famous for his happy faculty of unearthing "phenoms."
