BYRNES' WILD THROW GIVES TWO RUNS

CATCHER MADE WINNING RUN

Tozer Only Allows Five Hits, While Graham is Batted Seven Times. Oakland's New Men Tried Out

Special to The Herald. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—Today's game began with a rush, was slow in the middle and waxed hot again at the end. After throwing the game away twice the commuters won in the last half of the tenth after two men were out. It was Byrnes, whose wild throw in the seventh, gave the Angels two runs. Again in the ninth it was only poor coaching that prevented bringing home another run. It was a good beginning for the new man. Hackett, Oakland's new catcher, was also to have made his first appearance but there was no uniform on the ground big enough to fit him.



LEWIS AND BEAL TO MEET AGAIN

WRESTLER TO THROW OMAHA BOY THREE TIMES

SIGN AGREEMENT ARTICLES

Match Scheduled for September 19, When Champion Middleweight Will Try to Accomplish Feat in an Hour

Frank H. Lewis, champion middleweight wrestler of the world, and W. W. Beal, the Omaha boy who stood up to the champion long enough to win the purse at the last match between the two, will meet again on the mats at the Pacific Athletic club's pavilion Tuesday, September 19. The arrangements were made yesterday and an interesting contest is promised.

By the terms of agreement Lewis will throw Beal three times in an hour or take the short end of the purse. These two disciples of the mat art have met twice. Both times were at Ocean Park. In the first match Lewis agreed to throw four men in an hour and Beal was one of his contestants. The champion succeeded in bringing all four men to the floor in the specified time, but his hardest match was with Beal. He next signed articles to meet Beal and throw him three times in an hour. This second match was on a winner-take-all proposition, and Beal succeeded in standing up beyond the limit.

\$500 to Winner

Lewis is confident that he can throw Beal three times in an hour but his confidence is not so strong as to make him want another match on the winner-take-all plan. The purse agreed on is \$500 to the winner and \$250 to the loser. Ed Robertson, athletic director of the Jonathan club, will referee the contest.

Lewis is called the ex-champion middleweight wrestler of the world, but he is really entitled to full honors as champion, for while he was able to make middleweight he was undefeated. He outgrew the class, however, and had to give up the title. When in fighting trim he weighs 165 pounds, and cannot go below that without weakening himself.
