

ANGELS MAKE FIVE ERRORS AND INCIDENTALLY LOSE TO THE SEALS

TOZIER PITCHES GOOD GAME

Heartbreaking Story to Tell, but 'Tis Minus Consolation of Hard Luck Tale—Playing Becomes Farcical

San Francisco, 5; Los Angeles, 2. The crippled Angels were again defeated yesterday, San Francisco finding Tozier for a sufficient number of hits at critical stages of the game to keep ahead until the going soured.

However, it was not Tozier's fault entirely, as he allowed the Seals but six hits in the nine innings, while the Angels scored eight hits. A glance at the error column will explain the defeat.

The Seals put up an errorless game, while Flood, Smith and Tozier contributed one error each and Spies gave two toward assisting the boys from the north to take the game.

Roy Hitt, one of Capt. Wilson's new men, shied castors for the Seals and pitched a creditable game.

In the third inning San Francisco scored three runs, sufficient to win the game, on one hit. In the ninth inning they scored again without the assistance of a hit. This is the "reason why."

In only one inning did the Seals make more than one hit, the seventh, and in that inning two hits failed to bring them a run.

Tozier deserved to win his game, as he outpitched Hitt, but Hitt's men hit the ball at opportune moments and then "hit the grit" like ballplayers should, a sufficient number of them scooting around the sacks to knock another peg from under the locals and bring them closer to fourth position.

FIRE SWEEPS TOWN'S BUSINESS SECTION

La Porte Visited by a Conflagration Which Consumes Valuable Uninsured Property

MARYSVILLE, Sept. 19.—Almost the entire business section of the town of La Porte, in the mountains sixty miles east of here, has been destroyed by fire that started in the Chinese quarter at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and burned until noon. Advices received here say that all the business houses except Rosenberg & Jones' fireproof store were burned. This firm lost two large warehouses and their contents on which no insurance was carried.

The Mose Boreland and Frank Cayot hotels, the only ones in the town, were consumed. The Cayot livery stable, A. Harris' store, Mrs. Maxwell & Sons' store, Manuel Miguel's saloon, Tom Laramore's saloon and other business places were destroyed.

The residence section was saved. The loss, estimated at about \$100,000, is partly covered by insurance.

BROOKLYNITE INDICTED ON BIGAMY CHARGE

Grand Jury Returns Bill Charging Frederick E. Carlton With Having Four Wives

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Indictments accusing Frederick E. Carlton of Brooklyn of bigamy in marrying four women, three in Brooklyn and one at Rochester, N. Y., were found by the grand jury of Kings county today. It is alleged that he married Willetta S. Birken in this city in 1894; Lulu Ketterling at Rochester in December, 1897; Mary J. Smith in Brooklyn in 1903, and Marie Gorman in Brooklyn in 1904. He is alleged to have used the name of William E. Rodriguez in marrying the Rochester girl.

Carlton pleaded not guilty and the hearing was postponed to September 25 on his statement that he wanted witnesses from San Francisco.
