BELIEVE BENTLY IS IN HONDURAS

POLICE SAY ATTORNEY MAY HAVE FLOWN FAR

Theory That Employe of Title Guarantees and Trust Company Went to San Diego Is Doubtful

No clue leading to the discovery of the whereabouts of Greeley W. Bently, the missing clerk of the Title Guarantees and Trust company, has as yet been found by the police.

But why Bently should have gone to San Diego on Saturday night, instead of going to San Francisco on Friday night, arriving there Saturday morning and making connections with the weekly steamers for Panama from that port, is somewhat puzzling to them.

Still another opinion which seems likely to be the method which Bently would have chosen is that he never left this city for San Diego, but that he went direct from here to El Paso, Texas, and there made connections with the overland trains for the City of Mexico, thence to Vera Cruz, where he could easily have boarded one of the hundreds of fruit steamers leaving that well-known Mexican port for Honduras.

Still another feature of the mystery which bears out the Honduras theory, is that being of dark complexion, he could easily have secured passage on the Panama steamers and been mistaken for one of the Mexicans with only a small change in attire.

Mrs. Bently still refuses to see anyone but officers from the police department. Her mother, who continues to remain in the city, although Mrs. Bently is not ill, she is rapidly falling, due to worry about her husband.

GLITTERING GOLD THEIR RUIN

Youths' Cupidity Causes Them to Rob Employers' Desk After Yellow Coin Was Removed

The sight of \$150 in gold in his employer's desk led to the undoing of Candy Williams, 18 years old, employed in Phillips' printing shop, 308 West Second street.

He and his companion, Frank Knowmiller, 14 years old, 530 Wall street, were locked up yesterday morning by Detective Shearon on a charge of burglary, after confessing, according to the police, that they had forced an entrance to the shop through a rear window Thursday night.

PREACHER SECURES RELEASE

Rev. W. J. Dinwoodie of Fresno Is Acquitted of Charge of Unbecoming Conduct

The case against Rev. William J. Dinwoodie, a Methodist minister of the Fresno district, who was arrested Friday morning for unbecoming conduct, was dismissed by Justice Austin yesterday morning.

Patrolman Berchtold, who made the arrest, testified that the man conducted himself in an improper manner at the window of his room in view of pupils of the Amelia Street school.

Rev. Mr. Dinwoodie said he had rented a vacant room that he might use in dressing an old wound and that he had no intention of conducting himself improperly, nor did he know that he had offended anyone until he was taken into custody.

A pupil of the Amelia Street school testified to the offensive acts, while Rev. W. M. Sterling, J. H. Dinwoodie of Riverside, the prisoner's brother, and Frank Humphreys testified to Rev. Mr. Dinwoodie's character.
