A. NIEMEYER DEFIES MAYOR TO PROVE CHARGES

Residents of Central Avenue Protest Against Granting Permit and Long Established Business May Be Driven Out

Because he had thoughtlessly signed a petition protesting against permission being granted to J. H. Bestmann to conduct a wholesale liquor establishment at 1158 Central avenue, A. Niemeyer nearly lost his own license, and it is probable that before the board of police commissioners is through with his case his license may be entirely revoked.

These protests were so broad in their character and entered such strenuous objections to any liquor business in this locality, which is a residence neighborhood, that Commissioner Gates denied that the license of A. Niemeyer, who conducts a similar business on the corner of Eleventh street and Central avenue, be revoked.

"The mere fact that he signed such a petition is sufficient evidence against him and his license should be revoked on that account," said Commissioner Gates.

"I signed that petition because I had heard a certain city official say that in case Bestmann didn't get his license mine would be revoked, and that aroused my indignation and I arrayed myself on the other side," answered Mr. Niemeyer.

"It means me," the mayor spoke up. "I said that and I meant it. If this locality is no place for Bestmann it is no place for you."

Mr. Niemeyer denied that he had referred to the mayor in his statement, and intimated that the city clerk was the one who meant it.

RED FLAGGERS LEAD STRIKERS

MOSCOW INDUSTRIES ARE PARALYZED

Troops Do Not Use Arms, No Bloodshed Reported, and Streets Are Tranquil—Workers Object to Religious Lectures

MOSCOW, Oct. 10.—The majority of the factories here, especially in the great industrial quarter of Zamoskvo-rech, which is across the river from the rest of the city, joined in the strike of printers and bakers today.

The streets are comparatively tranquil. Several times today processions of striking workmen, in which red flags were carried, were held in the industrial quarters, and the police were forced to disperse the crowds, but aside from the affair today at the Liebrecht furniture factory no bloodshed has been reported and the troops were not forced to resort to arms.

Crowds of roughs started to break the windows in the Tverskoi boulevard, which has been reopened to traffic, but they fled on the approach of the police. The workmen generally are demanding an eight-hour day and a large increase in wages.

Among their unique demands is one for the abolishment of religious lectures by priests in the factories and the substitution of lectures on economic and political subjects.

THREE ROBBERIES REPORTED

Pickpockets Steal Man's Gold Watch, Porch Climber Gets Forty Dollars

Three of the most daring robberies that have recently occurred were reported to the police late last evening, in which a valuable gold watch and about \$100 were taken.

C. E. Palmer of 1437 East Forty-fifth street was the victim of one of the most clever pickpockets in Los Angeles. Palmer is the head man of the Bowen & Chamberlain real estate firm. And after spending the evening with friends he was relieved of a valuable gold watch, \$50 in paper and gold and a large package of valuable papers.

Palmer was waiting for a Hooper avenue car and seeing that it was not in sight, reached for his watch from his pocket when he found to his amazement that the watch was not in his pocket. At once he felt in his pocket and found that his money had been taken.

After sealing the wall with the aid of a climbing rose bush and a trellis a burglar entered the house of L. Greenwood, 323 North Broadway, late yesterday afternoon and secured \$40 from a bureau drawer. The burglar climbed up the side of the house and cut the screen on the second floor to secure entrance.

Mrs. Greenwood heard the noise and ran up the back stairs, but before she had gotten upstairs the man had made his exit by way of the front stairs and the front door. For some time Mrs. Greenwood searched the house but could find no traces of anyone.

SAYS HE WANTS THE MONEY

The small matter of \$100,000 is not in the calculations of such a man as E. H. Harriman, but it is a decent "good time" amount, says Scotty, and he wants it.

Scotty intends to go from Los Angeles to New York at a moment's notice and to take up sections and divisions to do it. He wants to do it. He has the money to do it. He intends to do it.

It is great sport for Scotty to race against Mr. Harriman. Harriman has a railroad. Scotty has none. If he had the money he would buy a railroad. Not having one, he is willing to burn up the Santa Fe and pay for the privilege.

Scotty said last night that he intended leaving Los Angeles in his special train and on race against his own time, which is the world's record, in the next week or ten days.

"I hold the world's record between Los Angeles and Chicago, forty-four hours and four minutes. That is a lazy old pace and I intend to reduce it to thirty-eight hours on this trip. All I want is that the Santa Fe give me the same train and as clear a right of way as I had before. I will be ready to start at any time. I will need one hundred men. And then he will be several hours behind the 'Scotty special.'"

WILL EMPTY THE SACK

In other words, Scotty, the Death Valley magnate and holder of the world's record between the east and the west, has no intention of permitting E. H. Harriman walking off with the prize, a great sack of gold between the Pacific and the great lakes.

Scotty and his sack of gold got into town yesterday. Mrs. Scott, whom the brawny and uncouth miner endearingly addresses as "Jack," is the treasurer of the association.

Scotty will know today if he is to be pitted against the great railway magnate and he says it matters little what the answer may be. He proposes to hold the record between the east and the west and all intermediate records.

PAT CROWE IS ARRIGNED

Prisoner Pleads Not Guilty to Shooting Charge—Will Waive Preliminary Hearing
