WATER PLANT
BIG STOCKHOLDERS DEFEAT
LITTLE ONES
 Former School Teacher Says He Was
 Inane, Not Drunk—City Council
 News—Pasadena

PASADENA, Oct. 10.—The North Pasadena Water company will not sell its plant to the city of Pasadena for \$80,000. The stockholders took all day yesterday and today to express their opinions of the proposition and it was a bitter fight. When the votes were counted tonight 619 votes were found in favor of the sale and 409 opposed to it. This gave the plan a majority of all votes cast, but a two-thirds vote of all the company's stock was required in order to sell the plant. The plan was presented. The total shares of stock amount to about 1530, only about two-thirds being voted. The victory is said to lie with the big stockholders as against the small holders. Just what will be the next move is not known.

Says He Was Inane
 Joseph W. Adams, arrested last night for frightening women on North Hudson avenue, the police claim, while under the influence of liquor, made so eloquent an explanation before Judge Wood this morning that the fine was fixed at \$5. Adams was for many years a school teacher, but in 1892, as he explains, he began to have symptoms of insanity, since which time for days at a stretch he has not been accountable for his actions. Twice before the police court diagnosed the man's ailment as a plain drunk and sentenced him accordingly. While sober Adams is gardener for Congressman McLachlan. He told the judge this morning that he had taken his first drink in Los Angeles yesterday afternoon, remembering nothing more until this morning when he awoke in the Pasadena jail.

City Council Matters
 At the meeting of the city council today Auditor Kernaghan submitted his side of the controversy between himself and city Treasurer Munson which culminated a few days since in the auditor holding up the treasurer's salary. Auditor Kernaghan recited the terms of the charter as requiring a daily return under oath and related how the city treasurer refused to make such returns. A ruling of the city attorney in support of the auditor and a letter of like import from Mayor Waterhouse were filed with the auditor's letter. The council avoided discussion and sent the whole matter to the finance committee for report. It is said that Treasurer Munson will at the proper time demand to be set free from what his friends term the "petty bickerings and technical idiosyncrasies" of the city auditor.

 During the past week three bicycles have been stolen from in front of the Y. M. C. A. building. The police have been notified but have not discovered any clues to the party or parties who are apparently making a business of stealing wheels.

 The enrollment at Throop Polytechnic institute reached 431 today, a considerable increase over the same day last year. The new department which provides lunches at cost is proving a decided success. Over 100 students use the dining room daily and it is likely that more room will be provided for those who desire to eat their lunches here.

COLTON IN FEAR OF INCENDIARIES
FIREBUGS TERRORIZE WHOLE COMMUNITY

San Bernardino Board of Trade Makes Elaborate Arrangements to Entertain Utah Pioneers, Who Arrive Today

SAN BERNARDINO, Oct. 10.—Colton had a fire scare last night. Incendiaries have terrorized the town for some months. The fire started in a barn owned by E. D. Roberts and the actual loss is about \$750. The building is near several other valuable buildings, several of which took fire and flying brands set fires several blocks away, so that for a time the town was in a panic. Word was sent to San Bernardino for relief, but was later countermanded.

The board of trade and Pioneer society have completed arrangements for the entertainment of the Utah pioneers who will arrive tomorrow as guests of the Salt Lake road. After a breakfast the visitors will be given a trolley ride to Urbia Springs, Highland and Redlands, seeing all parts of the valley which was but a desert when they visited it more than fifty years ago as pioneers of the trail. They will then be given a formal welcome by the city officials and board of trade and invited to spend the balance of the day with friends, leaving for Los Angeles late in the afternoon. In the party are those who for many years in the early fifties lived in this city and valley, being engaged in various pursuits. The change in the valley since those days will be a revelation to them.

Plans have been completed for the handsome new clubhouse for the Woman's club of this city to be erected this winter. It is to be built opposite the city park and will be of mission style of architecture. An auditorium with a stage and all needed accessories having a seating capacity of nearly 500 will be a feature of the building which will be complete in all its appointments. The plans have been completed and the financial portion of the matter will now be taken up.

San Diego Liquor Dealers Start in Under Recently Adopted Ordinance

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 10.—Every liquor dealer now in business in this city, including saloonkeepers, wholesalers and restaurant men, has applied for a new license under the conditions of the Kelly codification ordinance and the same will probably be granted at the council meeting on Oct. 16.

MONROVIA VOTES FOR BONDS
 Citizens Overwhelmingly Favor New Library and \$18,000 Public Park

MONROVIA, Oct. 10.—The election today at which the \$26,000 bond issue was submitted to the voters resulted in an overwhelming victory and the purchase of an \$18,000 public park site and of the Granite block for a city hall is now assured.

The women of the Saturday Afternoon club served refreshments all day near the polls. Automobiles and carriages reached every home in town, and many men came from a distance to vote. Last April \$6000 for a public park site failed of the necessary two-thirds vote, and the people refused to allow \$10,000 for a city hall building. TO BUY FIRE EQUIPMENT
 Ocean Park Trustees Decide on Protective Apparatus to Be Purchased

OCEAN PARK, Oct. 10.—The matter of providing the city with additional fire protection was considered by the board of city trustees who met last evening as a committee of the whole to take definite action on the matter. The result was that a total of \$3275 was appropriated for the purpose, the money to be spent as follows: One Waltrous gasoline fire engine, \$1850; two hand hose carts carrying 600 feet of hose, \$300 each; and 1500 feet of hose at 55 cents a foot, \$825. The A. J. Coffey company of San Francisco will furnish the equipment.

WILL ERECT HOSPITAL
 Santa Monica Physicians Considering Generous Offer Made by Eastern Philanthropist

SANTA MONICA, Oct. 10.—After numerous ineffectual attempts to awaken interest locally in the establishment of a modern, centrally located hospital building, the physicians of Santa Monica bay are now considering an offer from a capitalist, whose name for the present is withheld, of a proposal to furnish the site and necessary buildings on condition that proper equipment and maintenance is guaranteed by the medical organization. Dr. J. S. Hunt, when interviewed today concerning the project, said the plan was being given serious consideration and that definite action would be decided on within a few days.

A meeting of the members and friends of the Village Improvement society was held today at the residence of the president, Mrs. Frank L. Stearns, when further action in reference to the establishment of an ornamental drinking fountain was taken. The accepted design will be constructed of cast iron and the fountain, when Mayor Dudley and the road commissioner determine on a site, will be erected without any delay. As a means of increasing the funds in hand for the project the ladies are having many of their own ceramic drinking cups to be put on sale at all public places in town.
