REPEATS POPULAR LECTURE William Winter, Famous Dramatic Reviewer, Consents to Repeat Address at Blanchard Hall

William Winter, called the dean of dramatic reviewers and known all over the country as a lecturer and author, will repeat the address on "Theater and the Public," given before the Friday Morning club, this evening at Blanchard hall.

This address was written for delivery before the Twentieth Century club of Chicago, and was there received with such favor that it has since been repeated in many cities of the west.

This address is relative to the state of the contemporary age; the relation between the theater and the public; the attitude and duty of the press toward the theater; the dramatic movement in America, and the principles that ought to prevail in the public mind and in theatrical administration; together with an examination of the forces most potent in the American theater today, and a glance at famous actors of the last fifty years.

COMMITTEE WILL CALL ON SUPERVISOR GRAHAM

INDIGNATION MEETING HELD AT PROSPECT PARK

Speakers Say They Have Obtained Only Evasive Answers to Questions Regarding Condition of Highways. Other Meetings Planned

At a meeting of one hundred property owners of East Hollywood last night in the Prospect Park Methodist Episcopal church to protest against what they termed the constant neglect of the streets of that district by County Superintendent Al. J. Graham, a committee of five was appointed to again take the question of improvements up with the supervisors and also to find out just how much money was in the treasury available for street work in their district.

W. D. Fuller of Prospect Park was chosen chairman of the meeting, and J. B. Chamberlain secretary. J. B. Murphy, a property owner on Prospect street, who had called on County Superintendent Graham Monday in regard to improvements on several of the streets of Prospect Park, but that he had been unable to get anything but evasive answers to his questions as to what would be done.

GIRLS SOLD TO CHINESE

Extensive Traffic Being Carried on in Sending Young Women to the Orient

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Traffic in young women, purchased in Chicago for practical sale in all parts of the empire of China, has been discovered by local federal and police authorities, but thus far no law has been found prohibiting the exporting of American women to foreign countries.

The practice in the operation of the alleged ring was, it is believed, to first hire unsuspecting women, tempting them with lurid stories of wealth in the orient. A position of maid or high servant in wealthy Chinese families is said to have been the bait offered.
