

NEITHER WILL EXCUSE DEFEAT BERKELEY AND INDIANS ARE READY TO PLAY

Opposing Gridiron Warriors Say Victory Will Go to the Best Team. Both Elevens Are in Fine Fettle

This will be the first time that Berkeley's full strength has been exhibited in the south, as in former games the men have gone out of training and were not able to show the best that was in them.—Trainer Christy of the California team.

In brusque fashion Christy, trainer of the Berkeley football team, reached for the second glass of water that a thirsty squad man was preparing to imbibe at the noonday meal in the Angeles dining room yesterday.

The watchfulness of the guardian who looks after the condition of the California athletes came to the fore during a repeat Spartan-like in its simplicity, and if Berkeley loses in the game with the Sherman Indians today the defeat will not come as the result of a lack of physical training.

Secret practice had been scheduled for Fiesta park at 3 o'clock and every morsel that went into the mouths of the half-famished youngsters who breakfasted at early morning on the Owl was noted in hawklike manner by the quiet but determined "Chris."

The Berkeley men, twenty-five strong, are accompanied by Head Coach Knibbs, Assistant Coach Griffin and Trainer Christy. Immediately after their arrival they were driven to the Angeles hotel and entered into an impromptu reception by friends and university men of the city.

Manager Decoto stated that the team as it is playing today is the fastest aggregation that has been turned out at California in the last five years and he anticipated that the afternoon's battle with the Indians will be hard fought from the whistle.

Coaches Knibbs and Griffin have all the earmarks of the typical eastern directors, and their control over the men, according to Manager Decoto, is absolute. They both expressed themselves as satisfied that their team would give a hard game.

Trainer Christy stated that Southern California will get its first exhibition of Berkeley football with the men playing under training rules.

There are several southern men in the squad who may get in the game before the call of time. Forest Stanton, who played a strong game against the Stanford freshmen last Saturday, and Wharton, formerly of Pomona, are among the members chosen on Thursday night to come south and will be on the side lines at the start of today's contest.

SAINTS CRUSHED BY OCCIDENTALS

WINNERS EXHIBIT STARTLING FORM REVERSAL

Catholics Score First and Seem to Have Game Cinched, When Presbyterian Begin Terrific

The St. Vincent eleven was snowed under by a score of 24 to 6 by the doctory warriors of Occidental on the Highland Park campus yesterday afternoon, and the showing probably gives the relative merits of the two teams.

Occidental displayed an utter reversal of form from the game contested with the Berkeley men, twenty-five strong, as the play put up by both teams was at times ragged in the extreme, the Highland Park men outplayed their opponents at every stage after the first ten minutes, during which time the St. Vincents made a touchdown and appeared likely to take the game by reason of the weak resistance of Merrill's men.

The scoring of the Saints seemed to put new life into the Occidental hosts and after the second kick off there was nothing to the game but a rapid succession of long end runs by the 'Dentals and a line crushing exhibition in which the St. Vincents came out at second place.

The game throughout was replete with fumbles that marred the result and both elevens were guilty of the trick. Neither line at times seemed to be breaking through, with the result that the ball went flying from the back before he had obtained a start.

The weak showing of the men from Grand avenue was a complete surprise to those who had anticipated a victory for Haggerty's men on the form displayed by the contending teams in the games with the high school.

When St. Vincents caused the academics to give up before the onslaughts of her backs and won by a touchdown in a game of straight football, interest centered in the game that Occidental would put up against the high school, and in the result.

Clark, at full, and Northross, right half, made the most consistent ground for the Occidentals at sheer football, with Andrews of the St. Vincents doing the same work for his team.

The St. Vincent men were drawn in on fake plays and the end runs of the Occidental backs that brought the ball over yards of territory were disastrous for their ebbing strength, and a few backs from the twenty or twenty-five yard line carried the skin across for the ever present touchdown.

The St. Vincent team started like winners and went through the orange and yellow line for long gains during the initial stages of the practically seven minutes after the call of time, when Acker, Andrews and Cunningham had carried the ball forty yards into the Occidental territory by straight line bucks, Phelps nabbed the ball and ran for a touchdown and came back with a rush that swept the Saints off their feet.
