Y. M. C. A. ARRANGES BIG CONTEST FOR NEW MEMBERS

FIVE TEAMS WILL BE PUT IN THE FIELD

Arthur Letts Offers Prize of \$50 to Winners and a Banquet Will Be Served to the Victorious Team at One of the Hotels

The board of directors of the Y. M. C. A. of Los Angeles yesterday completed plans for a contest among the members, having for its object raising a members' building fund for its new building and at the same time to increase the present membership of the local association by at least 2000.

The plan of the contest is to have five teams of ten men each, each team representing one of five newspapers. The contest will open Nov. 1, 1905, and will close Jan. 20, 1906. The team representing the paper securing the greatest number of new members in the allotted time will be declared the winner and its members will be given a banquet at one of the big hotels, and as a further incentive President Letts of the association has offered a reward of \$50 to be divided among the members of the successful team. Twenty per cent of the funds received from the new members secured during the contest will be set aside for the members' building fund to hasten the completion of the association's new headquarters.

The plan has received the hearty endorsement of the newspaper men, bankers, doctors, lawyers and business men of the city and is promised warm support.

The new building for which the fund is being raised will be modern in every particular and one of the most pretentious and convenient Y. M. C. A. buildings in the country. After studying the newest and most modern association buildings of the east, Architect A. B. Benton radically changed the original plans for the building. The new plans reserve the first floor for the association's use and it will be given over to a members' parlor, social room, lobby and the secretaries' offices.

ST. JOHN SCORES OLD PARTIES

Ex-Governor of Kansas Exhorts His Hearers to Vote as They Pray

Ex-Governor John P. St. John of Kansas addressed an enthusiastic audience of prohibitionists at Elks' hall last night. Both the old parties, he said, "stand on the same platform. The only difference being that one declares for tariff reform, while the other proposes to reform the tariff."

He criticised the Philippine policy, condemned the navy, and immigration, and said he did not believe in protecting everything but muscle.

The speaker stated that the consumption of liquor per capita had increased from two gallons in 1864 to twenty gallons in 1904. He said: "There are now 250,000 saloons in the country and there is not a saloon-keeper in all the land who is not either a Republican or a Democrat. This country is traveling rapidly toward universal drunkenness and no nation can live half drunk and half sober, with apologies to Lincoln."

He then proceeded to criticize his own party, declaring that it must now broaden out and consider some of the other great issues, citing the trusts. In conclusion he exhorted his audience to break away from the two old parties and vote as they pray.

To Improve the Brazos By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Secretary Taft today decided in favor of the contention of Representatives of Texas regarding the improvements of the Brazos river. The last river and harbor bill appropriated \$75,000 for beginning the work which will ultimately cost several millions if the entire project is approved by future legislation. The decision of the secretary allows the expenditure of the \$75,000 for beginning the work.

Negro Troops Going to Mindanao By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Secretary Taft today decided to send the Twenty-fourth regiment of infantry (negro troops) to Mindanao, Philippine Islands, their second term of service there.

FRIDAY MORNING CLUB MAY BUILD NEW HOME

Members of the Friday Morning club will build a new club house or add to the present home on Figueroa street. This much they have determined. How, when and where will be considered at a special meeting called for 1:30 o'clock next Friday afternoon. Yesterday the club members met in business session and the morning was devoted to a discussion of the problems before the club at the present time, restricting the membership or providing more commodious quarters.

The proposition of the Friday Morning club buying the club house from the club house association was considered, but no definite action could be taken as the directors consider it necessary to call a meeting of the stockholders before setting the price. Some of the stockholders would be glad to allow the club to purchase the building at the cost price, but the property has greatly increased in value and there are those who demand the benefit of the increase.

Many of the club members believe it would be better to buy a site and erect a new building much larger than the present structure. No definite plan was reached and a meeting of the stockholders will be called before the following meeting Friday afternoon.
