YOUNG PEOPLE TO HOLD MEETINGS TODAY

Several California Unions Already Have Decided Against Nicotine. Action to Be Considered by Delegates

"Shall the Y include tobacco in its pledge?" This is the question which the Young Woman's Christian Temperance union, meeting in national conference today, will decide.

Temperance temple will be turned over to the "Ys" today and everything in convention work will make way for them.

Miss Emma Yoe, the California state secretary, has been making plans for this meeting for many weeks and in addition to the regular sessions she has arranged two receptions. This evening the young people will be entertained at the home of Dr. and Mrs. D. W. Edwards, of 900 Beacon street, when they will meet the national secretary, Miss Cora A. Seberry, and on the evening of "Pasadena day" they will be received at the home of Judge and Mrs. J. H. Merriam of Pasadena.

Miss Cora Seberry, the head of the union in America, has arrived from New York, and will preside at the conference today. There will be a morning session, at the conclusion of which the members will march in a body to the Young Woman's Christian association where they will be served with luncheon, and in the afternoon the delegates will convene again.

Miss Seberry is a native of New York and a daughter of Dr. Alice B. Campbell, one of the first women to study medicine in the state of New York.

For several years Miss Seberry has been national officer and was called to her present office at the national convention in Philadelphia. Her organization, the young woman's branch aims to enlist young women and young men and establish them in temperance principles, by the organization of Young Woman's Christian Temperance unions and by branches. Its object is to forward the cause of total abstinence, and to establish an equal standard of purity for young women and young men.

Miss Elizabeth Thomas is Miss Seberry's chief assistant. Board of Education Grants Request of W. C. T. U. Leaders

The work of the W. C. T. U. will be brought before the children of the Los Angeles public schools.

The board of education has granted the request of the women for half an hour one day next week and yesterday it was decided to send out fifty of the best speakers now attending the national convention. The women will speak to the students of the eighth grade and other white ribbons will be sent out to the normal school the same day. The teachers' institute will meet one week earlier to accommodate the delegates to the convention and three women will go before the institute to give addresses.

Last evening the New Century club gave a banquet at the Young Woman's Christian association in honor of the W. C. T. U. women who are also prominent in socialistic circles.

WILL BUILD PHYSICIANS' CLUB

Plans Under Way in Chicago Contemplate Establishment of \$2,000,000 Home for Doctors

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—Impetus was given to a movement having for its object the erection of a \$2,000,000 home for the physicians of Chicago at a meeting of the Physicians' club last night. It is planned to raise \$500,000 to start the project, one hundred members of the various medical societies of Chicago contributing \$5000 toward that purpose. The home will consist of club rooms

with the various provisions made for the social interests of the members that are ordinarily found in well equipped institutions of similar character. Lecture rooms and other features necessary to the demands of the organization are to be provided for.

KILLS DANGEROUS INDIAN

Drunken Brave Flourishes Gun and Is Shot—Outbreak Narrowly Averted

SALT LAKE, Oct. 25.—Report was received here today of a killing at the village of Myton, Wasatch county, Utah, last Saturday, which came near resulting in trouble between the villagers and Indians camping in the region. A drunken Indian, who was going about the village with a cocked revolver, threatening the villagers, menaced a white man named W. T. Muse and was shot and killed.

Other Indians came into town threatening vengeance and were making an ugly demonstration when a troop of cavalry came upon the scene from Fort Duchesne. Citizens had telephoned to the fort that "the postoffice was in danger." The cavalrymen took charge of Muse and turned him over to the sheriff. He is in jail at Heber.

Coroner Investigates Death SAN JOSE, Oct. 25.—The coroner today is investigating the case of Martin Skufa, a laboring man, who was found dead in a lodging house on West Santa Clara street last night. Skufa had been at the house for a week, but it is not known where he came from. It is believed that death was the result of natural causes.
